Sister I. F. Kierstead in a recent issue of the Highway gave a very touching account of her work in Africa, which should move us to do our best for a people hungering for the gospel, and who when wrought upon by its power, manifest such love and loyalty to the cause of Christ that it puts us to shame who live in the land of light and opportunities that we have and are still neglecting so great salvation. Let us examine ourselves and make sure we are not neglecting something pertaining to this salvation. Have we been saved to serve, or to live at ease while others perish? Did not Christ say, I am among you as he that serveth.
