EDITORIAL

THE FIRST CAMP-MEETING

In those days came John the Baptist preaching in the wilderness of Judaea. Matt. 3:1.

In many respects the work of John the Baptist was similar to our camp-meeting work of today.

First he went away from the cities to the country, away from the noise and rush of business life to a quiet place, and many who were interested in spiritual things followed him there, and found salvation, and much blessing by listening to John's gracious words.

Again the nature of his preaching was very similar to that of camp-meeting preachers of our day. It was peculiarly evangelistic. John preached: repent ye, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand. His objective was not to obtain followers but to get men saved from sin. John also insisted on thoroughness in his work with the souls of men and he was not afraid to condemn sin everywhere, whether in the king on his throne, like he condemned Herod for taking his brother's wife and living in adultery, or in the common people such as the Pharisees and Sadducees, whom he called a generation of vipers, and of whom he demanded fruits meet for repentances, before he would baptize them, when they came out to his baptism.

We preachers would do well to follow more closely perhaps, John's manner of preaching and dealing with souls.

John also preached two works of grace. He said: I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance, but he that cometh after me is mightier than I: he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and fire.

Note John preached two baptisms, water baptism for the truly penitent, believing soul, and the baptism with the Holy Ghost to cleanse the believer's heart from all sin.

Now this same doctrine of the double cure for sin, is being preached all around the world, and hundreds of camp-meetings will be held this summer throughout Canada and the United States where these great evangelistic truths will be preached by men with the Holy Ghost sent down from heaven, and a great many souls will hear and be converted and sanctified wholly as in past years. They will come from cities, towns, country places, and be saved and blessed and go back to live and testify in their homes and churches and thus be a blessing to others in helping to spread these great gospel truths. Be sure to come to Beulah Camp-meeting this year and hear this

glorious gospel preached and sung by Holy Ghost filled people.

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Our troubles will bring us blessings. The clouds will empty themselves before long, and every tender herb will be the gladder for the shower. Our God may drench us with grief, but He will not drown us with wrath; nay, He will refresh us with mercy. Our Lord's love letters often come to us in black-edged envelopes. His wagons rumble, but they are loaded with benefits. His rod blossoms with sweet flowers and nourishing fruits. Let us not worry about the clouds, but sing because May flowers are brought to us through April showers.—C. H. Spurgeon.
