### A MESSAGE FOR YOUNG AND OLD

Is contained in the editorial by Brother Dow in the May 15th issue of the Highway, entitled Organization Versus Spirituality. A surplus of organization and a lack of co-operation, the two dangers warned of by our Editor, both have a threatening relationship to our Young People's Societies. The modern Church has lost her power and is substituting program. Preachers are filled with edrcation, but void of the Holy Spirit. Churches are strong in human organization and weak in Divine power. Let us be cautious lest we also be affected by this modernistic method of carrying on our work. Our need is a minimum of man-invented methods and a maximum of God-imparted power.

The second problem, the necessity of cooperation between the young people and the older church members in our work has a most important and vital relation to us. Personally, I believe that every member of a Young People's Society should be a regular attendant at, and an ardent supporter of the regular prayer meeting and Sunday services, and that the older folk should, as often as

possible, attend the young people's meetings and support the young pepole's work. Not. only do I believe that this state of co-operation and unity should exist, but that it must be the plan followed if our young people are to be the blessing to the Church that God wants them to be. The separating of the two bodies, in the sense of the two holding aloof from each other, will invariably lead to a feeling of separateness, and this should not be. We need the influence and council of the older saints, and they need the encouragement and inspiration given by the vitality and the promise of youth. Let us cooperate to the unifying of the body of Christ. We are united in Him. Should we be separated in our worship of Him?

Read and gratefully accept the good council of our godly Editor, and with singleness of purpose unite to help each other in the building up of the Church of the Lord Jesus.

# SUGGESTIVE BIBLE STUDY VALLEYS OF THE BIBLE

If we did not have the valleys in nature we would have the high hills and lofty mountains. The spiritual valleys have enabled us to have the mountain peaks of God's grace.

1. Valley of Dry Bones. Ezekiel 37:1-14. God gives us a picture of the whole house of Israel and a picture of sinners who are "dead in trespasses and in sins." They are hopeless, helpless and lifeless, until God intervenes.

2. Valley of Decision. Joel 3:2. There may be a literal valley of decision. There is a spiritual valley of decision for every son of Adam's race. Multitudes have lingered in the valley of decision under the white light of truth and deep conviction to choose the right way and move on to glory, or to take the wrong way and slip into Hell. Multitudes are in the valley of decision all over the world. Oh, that they would make the right choice!

3. Valley of Faith. II. Kings 3.16. Elisha admonished the people of Israel to make the valley full of ditches. "Ye shal not see wind, neither shall ye see rain: yet that valley shall be filled with water." We cannot bring the rivers of salvation, but we can dig the ditches in faith and irrigation, so God can turn loose rivers of his grace on our soul.

4. Valley of Death. Psalm 23:4. To the sinner this is a dark valley, but to the Christian it is the valley of fellowship, protection, comfort and consolation. This is a very deep valley because Heaven, the highest of all mountain peaks of Christian experience, lies on the other side of death. We need Christ with us in this great valley. He is the only one who can take the fear from the last valley, and take us through to the Mountain of Glory.
