Sister Sharpe was a charter member of the Reformed Baptist Church of Millville, which was organized in January 1889, and was clerk for some time. She taught the young women's class for many years. Her home was always open to the prophets of the Lord and like Deborah, she was a mother in Israel. The pillars are passing to their reward and upon whom shall their mantle fall?

Sister Sharpe was 79 years old, and had lived with her husband over 62 years. She leaves to mourn their loss, her husband, nearly 84, a son-in-law, two grand-children, and a host of friends.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. S. G. Hilyard, Tuesday afternoon, May 14th, assisted by Rev. L. T. Sabine. A short service at the home consisted of singing, "Does Jesus Care" and "God Will Take Care of You". Scripture by Brother Hilyard, prayer by Brother Sabine.

At the church the choir sang "Your Father Knoweth", "Rock of Ages", and "The Christian's Goodnight". The message was based on Phil. 1:21, after which Brother Sabine spoke a few words representing the brethren and former pastor.
