#### **EDITORIAL**

## ORGANIZATION VERSUS SPIRITUALITY

We do not mean to imply by the coption of this article that we cannot have organization and spirituality in the same body, for we believe that a church, to be strong and successful, should comprehend both. Our God loves order and system which is demonstrated by His wonderful creation and the laws which govern this universe. The early church of Jesus Christ seemed to be organized. It had its various offices, filled by pastors, teachers, deacons. They gave to Paul and Barnabas the right hands of fellowship, which evidently made them members of the organization. We believe however that the early church had a very simple organization and that without any schisms. The apostle writes. There is one body and one spirit even as ye are called in one hope of your calling. One Lord, one faith, one baptism. So it seems that there was the minimum of organization and maximum of spirituality which is as it should be today. The tendency today seems to be toward organization, and away from spirituality. Or in other words the less spiritual churches become the more organizations they want, and the more spiritual they are the less they emphasize organizations. Every modern religious society is organized today as it never was before. We have in our Sunday Schools organized classes for pupils of every age, and they all have their business routine to go through every Sunday and plans to make and talk over for social affairs during the week so very little time is left to study the word of God or the Sunday School lesson. And almost every church has its Brotherhood, Boy Scouts, Wolf Pack, Girl Guides C. G. I. T., senior young people's society, junior young people's society, etc. So there is no lack of organization and each of these have their little programs to work out in the way of entertainment and social life, and very little time is given to spiritual life or soul culture. Now the tendency with these various societies is toward division or schism, which God never ordained. Each member is taught and feels he must support his own little society, and attend its meetings, and he or she soon loses interest in other services of the church because they feel they belong to some other group. Hence the members of the young people's society will attend their own meetings but very rarely will be found at the regular prayer meetings of the church, because they seem to feel no obligation to support them, and there is a spirit of division between the young people and older members of the church which is not helpful or conducive to the building up of a strong

spiritual body. I find no hint in the scriptures where Jesus or the apostles ever set any age limit, or drew any lines between the young people and older ones of the church. The fact is they all need to worship together. The older members need the inspiration which comes from the courage, zeal, and optimism of the young people. And whether they realize it or not, the young people need the counsel, and steadying influence of those of more mature years, who have learned some things by experience in years of service which the younger ones have not had.

Please don't misunderstand me now, I am in full sympathy with encouraging our young people to take on responsibility not only in their own societies, but responsibility in every phase of our church work, and also I would give them every opportunity to develop their own talents and initiative which will be strong factors in carrying on the work of God in the churches; but I would have them feel that our young people's society is not a unit in itself; but only a part of the whole organism, a member of the body which for its own sake and the good of the body must work for the advancement of all the interests in our churches.

One member of the body, an arm, a hand, a leg, cannot live separated from the body, it must die. Let the young people come to our campmeetings this summer to work, boost, lift, pray for the success of all the meetings in the salvation of souls. Let them be sure to attend all the services and take an active part, and thus get the spiritual help they need to build them up on their most holy faith. Beware of becoming so busy transacting business relative to your societies that you neglect the means of grace for soul culture.

The Lord bless all our young people.
