That is one place where we wvill all have to appear, people may be avoided on this earth and some even evade the law courts of our country, but whether we like the thoughtt or not, we must all stand betore the judgment seat of Christ, there to receive for the deeds donae in the body whether they be good or bad. How careful we all should be not to lose our influence and bring reproach on the cause of Christ and by so doing add to His burdens.

As we look about us and see so many things that were considered solid and impregnable going down to ruin we should appreciate more and more our abiding Friend Who is the same yesterday and today and forever, on Whom we can depend. When we see nations like Germany breaking their word and repudiating the Treaty of Versailles which she solemnly promised to maintain, we should take greater care to see that our anchor is fastened to the Rock of Ages which will stand until time is no more and then be just as strong throughout the countless ages of eternity. Let us each one make sure that we have come to know God and not only that, but to seek each day to know Him better and to serve Him better
