The trend of weather in eastern and central United States for the last century has been generally toward higher temperatures at all seasons, according to the United States Weather Bureau, as set forth in the weekly weather and crop bulletin issued March 17 by the Department of Agriculture.

We had a very pleasant evening as we sang hymns, talks and entered into a few contests. The ladies exemplified their art when a very delicious lunch was served.

Brother Frank Jones, with very fitting words, on behalf of those present, presented the pastor with a sum of money and some produce. The pastor tried to express his thanks to these Records for New Haven, Conn., according to the statement reviewing recent temperature trends and the winter of 1932-33, covering a period antedating the Revolutionary War, show three outstanding warm periods in the last 150 years. The first occurred early in the last century; the second about seventy-five years later, and the third during the last twenty-five years. Spring and fall trends have been uniformly up, ward for more than half a century. The upper trend of summer temperatures showed a slight recession from about 1875 to 1912, thereafter advancing moderately from year to year.

For the fall, winter and spring seasons, the average temperatures for the past twenty years, says the bulletin, are from 2.5 degrees to nearly four degrees higher than similar averages up to sixty or seventy years ago. Temperature data for some other North Hemisphere countries show strikingly similar conditions.

The records show unmistakably that for **x** number of years the central and eastern area has been and is in the midst of a period of prevailing warm weather which has continued much longer than any other similar period of record.— Selected.
