Stanley W. Keith of Passaic, N. He was brought to the Hospital for treatment for appendicitis but did not recover. He was a son of B. Ansley and the late Amanda Keith, of Millstream and had resided in Millstream, Kings County, until about nine years ago when he went to the United States to make his home.

He had charge of the dairy produce for the firm of George Weston Limited, biscuit manufacturers, at their Passaic plant and brought splendid aptitude to that place. His death has brought deep sorrow to a wide circle of friends. Besides his wife and his father, he is survived by three brothers, Ora A., of Berlin, N. H., Otty M., of Westfield Centre, Kings County, and Samuel E., of Saint John, and one sister, Mrs. G. A. Taylor, Apohaqui, Kings County.

The funeral service was held Tuesday, the body having been sent to Apohaqui Monday to to the home of Mrs. G. A. Taylor.

A short service was held at the house after which the remains were taken to the Head of Millstream where the funeral service was held in the Reformed Baptist Church by the writer, assisted by Rev. H. E. Mullen.

Rev. Arthur F. Ingler

From the city of Pawtucket, Rhode Island, on Thursday, August 8th, Rev. Arthur F. Ingler, the "Sweet Singer in Israel" slipped away to the "Pearly White City."

He had been a great sufferer for several years, having suffered a stroke some four or five years ago, that rendered him unfit for further work in the ministry, and from which he never recovered.

Many readers of the King's Highway will recall memories of our precious departed brother. He had labored in several of our churches as singer or evangelist, and also, I believe, once visited Beulah Camp. Brother Ingler had a rare talent for music and singing, which won for him the well merited title, "The sweet singer in Is-

rael." He wrote a large number of hymns and gospel songs which appear in many books in common use, and besides his hymn-writing, he compiled a number of song books that are in common use, among them, songs of the "Blood Washed", and "Canaan Melodies". But above all, he will be best remembered by his immortal song, "Pearly White City". The strains of this song have girdled the globe and wherever the English language is spoken its heavenly strains have gone to bless mankind. No one could hear those beautiful words, descriptive of Heaven, and inspiring tune, that perfectly suited the words, without having a higher appreciation of Heaven and a deeper desire to enter the Pearly Gates. As long as English is spoken and hymns are sung, Rev. A. F. Ingler's spirit and influence will live in the "Pearly White City".

He has gone on before us a little while to prove the reality of the vision the Lord gave him of the Holy City.

What this precious man of God has meant to the writer could not well be put in words. It was he whom I first heard preach full deliverance from sin and a happy and victorious life. And it was not only his preaching that convicted me but his life exemplified what he preached, for the very shine on his face, and the power and unction that was upon him when he preached or sang, put a hunger on my heart for the blessing of holiness.

He spent a month or more in my wife's home when she was but a girl, and through him she and her mother and probably others of the family were led into full salvation; That entire family have ever cherished the memory of Brother Ingler and only eternity will reveal what his influence has meant to them.

It was during his stay in this home and while holding meetings in the little school house nearby, that I came under his preaching and influence. God seemed to have sent him all the way from California to Digby County, Nova Scotia for the purpose of leading some of us into the experience of entire sanctification.

Brother Ingler was a native of New York State, and was once associated with the Metropolitan Church Association better known as the Burning Bush, but later changed to the Church of the Nazarene where he remained till called to the Church Triumphant.

He was twice married, his first wife having passed away some 20 years or more ago. A daughter, Olive, by this union, survives, and also his second wife, who was formerly Rev. Lura Horton.

Brother Ingler has preached and sung the gospel of full salvation from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from the Southern States to Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and God alone knows how many souls have been won to Jesus by his tender gospel appeals and unctions and almost seraphic singing. Ardent love, deep humility, prayerful devotion, and tenderness of spirit, were outstanding features of his fine personality.

Where has God found a man to fill his place?
