MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENCE

Hartland, M. S., Paulpietersburg, Natal, South Africa. June 24, 1935.

Dear Highway:

Once again we greet you, and are still rejoicing in the victory the Lord is giving us. We have much for which to praise Him in the victories which we are constantly seeing in our work, for the progress and development which we see in our native church in the native workers and laity in general. Not all are showing progress, but a very encouraging majority.

Since my last writing I have visited the Moolman church and we had a splendid meeting there, and the new Peevan branch twice, where we find much for which to rejoice. Many have opened their doors to the gospel and several have given themselves to the Lord, one devil doctor, and one "Isangoma" or spiritualistic medium. The devil doctors we have described before, and the only difference between an "Isangoma" and American Spiritualist, one is cultured the other is ignorant, both devilish. One behind a veneer of culture is hiding his devilish ways of fooling the public, especially the weak minded, the other ignorant, unlearned yet fooling the public by the same auto-suggestions that a cultured American Spiritualist would give. I have seen and heard both. I was passing through the country here, not long ago and here was one of these "Isangoma" at work, in filthy looking heathen dress, and there before her sat a row of poor foolish dupes who had come to consult her regarding their relationships with some of their friends and neighbours just as a group of educated Americans would do I have, in past years, seen and heard some of the so called "greatest" spiritualists in Boston with thousands of well dressed men and women, the so called "Elite" of Boston listening to their false communications, just as these poor uneducated heathen do in this country, but thank God the Gospel which we preach, when given a chance will transform one of these cultured Spiritualists of America or a degraded native "Isangoma" in South Africa. We have seen a number of both devil doctors and "Isangoma" come in touch with the living Christ and become transformed, and are today a living testimony to His power while others have died triumphantly, rejoicing in Him.

Yesterday we visited "Emfeni", where two years ago the devil doctors over ran the place, and where the people are now calling for the gospel which alone can satisfy. We had a splendid service in a little new mud and thatch church which we expect to have officially opened in about two weeks' time. Paulina and Phillip her husband are stationed there now and doing splendid work.

Our quarterly commences on Wednesday, and continues for a week, including the first Sunday of Beulah. We are expecting victory both there and here.

This may interest the kind friends who have helped toward the motor. Three weeks ago I took some patients to the Hospital in Durban who were able to pay toward the expenses of the trip, thus saving them about three quarters of what it would have cost them by rail, one of the patients being a blind man who would have required an attendant. This trip, the operation on both eyes, and his stay in the Zulu Mission Hospital, will not cost him fifty dollars. If we did not have the car, it would have cost him over a hundred dollars which he could not raise. If it were not for the kindness and mercy of the American Board Mission which supports this Hospital in Durban, a Hospital which will command the res-

pect and admiration of all who come in contact with it, this operation and the necessary stay in Hospital would have cost at least six hundred dollars in the Government Hospital in Vryheid. We thank God for the McCord Hospital, for its splendid staff of doctors and nurses, for its treatment of all Missionaries, of whatever Denomination, for its splendid service to the native and Indian population. This is where Faith was, and no one could be treated better in a hospital. Had they not been so reasonable, and also willing to wait till we could pay them, she could not have had her operation. Any one who has met Doctors McCord and Taylor, would say they have met true Christian gentleman, and their wives have proved themselves worthy partners willing to make any sacrifice for this great work.

Trusting that you have a good Camp-meeting, and that we shall soon hear of the soon coming of our reinforcements to push the battle for Holiness in this dark land, yours happy in a Salvation that saves, sanctifies and keeps and delivers from that "Isms" of culture of heathen-
