# REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE

We deeply regret the fact that we find it necessary to protest against the continued increase of Sabbath desecration. Since we are citizens of a Christian land, and find even in the smallest of our country communities church buildings in which the word of God has been proclaimed for generations back, and pratically every home, possesses a copy of the Word of God we wonder why or how the great majority at the present time have forgotten the command of God: "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy."

Can anyone in this enlightened age give us their reasons for failing to obey this fundamental law?
