## DISTRICT NO. 1 RALLY

The prayers and testimonies of both the young people and the older ones were a real inspiration and blessing. At eleven o'clock our General President, Lic. G. A. DeLong brought a very helpful message from Psalm 94:18. He said that the way to keep from falling is to recognize and admit that our feet would slip without God's help, and then call upon Him for help.

At 2:30 p. m. the annual business meeting was held. The new officers were elected as follows: President, Lic. Norman Sanders; Vicepresident, Rev. H. J. S. Blaney; Secretary Treasurer, Miss Margaret Tedford. A very good paper on The Spiritual Benefits of Reading was read by way of introducing the theme of reading among our young people. Then Mrs. L. T. Sabine, Rev. G. A. Rogers and Rev. J. A. Ownes were called upon to discuss the matter as it impressed them, which they did in a way which made every one present feel the importance of the subject being dealt with. After this the chairman, Bro. Blaney, brought forth a proposition which has been discussed more or less among our young people for some time past namely, that of a lending library for our district. After considerable discussion a motion was passed to provide for a committee which should be impowered to proceed at once with the undertaking. We feel that this is another forward step in the work of our young people.

The closing service was in charge of Brother Delong. He brought a message from Proverbs 14:34, revealing to us the results of sin. God honored his message and crowned the service with one soul at the altar.

We were blessed in having the E. N. C. Quartet with us again, and their messages in song were a real blessing. So we do feel that we have a good report to bring and consider this was a splendid way for the young people to spend Thanksgiving Day. We would just say to any who could not attend, "You missed a real blessing".

The above mentioned committee was duly appointed by the chairman, and met in session at the close of the business meeting. After considerable deliberation certain rules and regulations were drawn up, and a permanent Library Committee appointed which shall have full charge of obtaining, censoring, and disposing of books. The committee is as follows: Rev. H. J. S. Blaney, Chairman; Miss Lois Goodspeed, Librarian; Miss Gertrude Cochrane, Secretary Treasurer; Rev. H. L. Robertson, Rev. F. A. Dunlop, Lic. G. A. De-Long.
