EDITORIAL

Another great camp-meeting has passed into history. It was great first, because of the presence of the Lord, which was manifested in so many ways during the alliance and camp-meeting. Rev. S. G. Hilyard, B. A., was elected alliance president, and filled the position in a very worthy and acceptable manner. Rev. Hollis Kimball was elected vice-president. Our evangelist, Rev. Dr. Butler, did excellent preaching. He has been with us in three camp-meetings at Beulah, and several said he excelled himself in his preaching this year. His messages were timely, and preached under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, were strong, clear, and convincing and many responded to his appeals at the altar calls and were definitely converted, reclaimed, and sanctified wholly. The people of God were fed, taught, and encouraged by his teaching. The attendance was good from the beginning, and kept increasing as usual, until the last Sunday of the meeting when it seemed that the crowd was the largest we have ever had at Beulah, which shows that interest, and attendance are still on the increase. Two men who made a careful survey, and count of the automobiles said, there were not less than one thousand present with many trucks. Those together with the train, and boats brought more than ten thousand people to Beulah this year. The tabernacle was taxed to its capacity at all three services on the last Sunday with many hundreds who could not get in. They gave splendid attention to the preaching and enjoyed the fine singing. The E. N. C. quartet came the last Thursday, remained over Sunday, and their singing added greatly to the interest of the meeting. There were also many other specials in trios, duets, and solos which were greatly enjoyed by all.

Two young men, viz., Rev. Bennett Cochrane and Rev. George Delong were ordained to the gospel ministry on the last Friday afternoon. This was a very solemn, and impressive service. Three other young people, two young men and one young woman were recommended by the Alliance to receive license to exercise their gifts in exhortation and preaching the gospel.

The last Saturday night the annual missionary meeting was held, with a very large congregation present. Dr. H. C. and Mrs. Sanders and five of their young people, our missionaries on furlough from Africa, were present. The five young people sang a very fine selection at this service. Two of these young people, viz., Charles and Grace, we expect to send back to our mission field in Africa this coming winter.

Appeals were made by Rev. L. T. Sabine and Rev. F. A. Watson for money to support the

foreign and home work and the people responded nobly, and gave in cash and pledges over one thousand dollars in that service.

The last service was on Sunday night, July 12 with a good response to the altar call, where several souls found pardon and purity. Then followed singing and many inspiring testimonies and finally a great farewell service when all joined hands and made a large circle and sang several old favorites, then the closing prayer.
