SOME PROBLEMS OF A SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHER

One problem a Sunday School teacher has to cope with is indifference to the lesson. Some scholars seem to come to Sunday School to discuss the weather, their work, or any subject other than the lesson. If the teacher joins in a discussion of this sort the benefits of that lesson are lessened. The best way I think to overcome this problem is to be determined to stay on the lesson. Another problem is study. How much time shall I put on my lesson? I heard of one teacher when asked this question who said she started as soon as Sunday School was over preparing her lesson for next Sunday. She had a fine class, all interested, who were in their places each Sunday, when at all possible. Another teacher said he studied his lesson Sunday morning, while shaving to go to Sunday School. Is it any wonder his class kept diminishing? and the ones who came were disinterested and glad when Sunday School was over. A good plan is to study some time every day.

Still another problem is to make the lesson interesting to your class. Each teacher should consider the age and standing of their class when studying the lesson. A lesson for ten-year-olds would not interest teen-age pupils. If a teacher has unsaved scholars of understanding age he should make salvation so real and so much to be desired that there will be a hunger for salvation. The truth of salvation can sometimes be taught much better than it can be preached.

Also to be a good teacher one doesn't have to be a preacher. A class likes to discuss the themes and ask questions and to answer each other's questions. A wise teacher will not try to preach but will encourage the class to talk. A good motto for a Sunday School teacher is, "Know Jesus, know your lesson and know your class." Many problems will confront the teacher at times, but if we can take them to the Great Teacher, who was in all points tempted like as we are, He will solve every problem and cause us to triumph over all.
