EDITORIAL

When our Young People's Association was still in the cradle of its infancy, one of its own members suggested that the above caption be chosen as the slogan of that youthful organization. The more we consider this slogan and the purpose embodied therein, the more thoroughly we are convinced that, as a principle of aim and action, no more lofty or beautiful ideal could have been chosen. Herein is the two-fold purpose for which we exist; beautifully expressed is the task of each member of each society comprising the enrollment of the union; revealing Christ to young people, and bringing young people to Christ. Let us not, as others, be deceived into believing that the Christ way is not the way they seek, and the Christ life is not the life they desire. The highway of this modern age is thickly populated with adult life that which will satisfy the inward yearning that so intensely seeks its ultimate.

"Christ for the young people" is our answer, our only answer, to the call of these hungry hearts. If we can bring them into contact with the Man of Galilee, their restless rovings will be o'er.

Oh how great importance then is the first part of our slogan. They seek they know not what but we know what they seek. Furthermore, it is very clearly indicated in the Word that, if souls are to be led to the Saviour, it must be through someone who is already acquainted with Him so intimately that they can bring others to a place of like fellowship.

Do we sense the great heart-yearning of the youth of our day? Do we realize that "none but Christ can satisfy"? Is the fact of our responsibility as youthful ambassadors recognized? If so, let us gladly and courageously take up the task and we shall go forth to win for the Master the young people of to-day.

"It is not the will of your Father which is in Heaven that one of these little ones should perish."—Matt. 18:14.

The words of the text reveal to us the will of God concerning the children. The words also imply that these children are in danger. One of the most expressive words in the Bible is employed respecting them—the word "perish". Do we realize the full meaning of this fearful word? Jesus uses this term as the opposite to everlasting life and hence it means not only the destruction of the body but also of the soul.

Are our children—these boys and girls who we speak to so carelessly and pass by so thought-lessly—really in great danger? The Psalmist says "They go astray as soon as they be born, speaking lies." These children so sweet and innocent to us are born with a depraved nature and so they are in danger, first, from the depravity of their nature. No matter how much we love children we must not forget that they are "shapen in iniquity."

Our duty towards the children is clearly set forth in the words of the text. His will is our law. He wills that they should be saved, therefore it is our duty to labor and pray to that end. Are we fulfilling all His will in this respect? Are we as concerned about the children of our church and our community as we should be? Here is an opportunity for every young person to be of service. Help make the children's meetings interesting. Support the leader by your prayers and assistance. Get into close relationship with the children and let them feel your interest and sympathy and above all strive with God's help to set them a good example.
