## INTERESTING ITEMS

Dr. T. H. Norton, editor of Chemicals, estimates the chemical value of the Dead Sea at \$1,265,000,000,000.—Selected.

The largest immigration in the history of Palestine occurred in 1935 with the entry of 61,541 Jews. Last year's record total represents an increase of almost 50 per cent over the peak figure of 1934, when 42,359 Jewish immigrants were admitted. In 1935 there were 4,525 immigrants in the capitalist category, and 3,564 in 1934.—Selected.

"Believe it or not", but the subscription list of two of Russia's most famous atheistic organs has dropped very noticeably. The official organ of the Soviet anti-religious campaign has seen its subscription list drop from 200,000 to 100,000 in the short period of three years. Another paper, the "Anti-Religious", in 1931 published 37,700 copies and in 1934 they published only 12,000. Evidently the Russian people are getting hungry for something more substantial than denials.—Selected.
