"IF THE EOUNDATION BE DESTROYED"

"In the eleventh Psalm the Psalmist asks: "If the foundations be destroyed, what can the righteous do?" The question is important, and the answer must be found in the particular emergency that arises when evil has won so great a victory as to take away some necessary part of the foundations of life.

Some years ago, when the noted evangelist William A. Sunday was beginning a revival meeting in Boston, he said: "The curses of America today are Modernism, Materialism, Humanism and Communism." Modernism, as used in such a statement, refers to the new religion that grows out of the evolutionist theory of human origin as compared with the creationist theory taught in the Bible. It replaces the old theology with the new, and if it recognizes God at all in history, (which atheistic evolution does not) it makes of Him merely the tribal god of the Hebrews. Materialism considers itself able to fully explain the facts of the universe by the existence and nature of matter. Humanism makes man, not God, the center and authority in the world. It is the theory of evolution applied to the social problems of life, as materialism is the same theory applied in the realm of material things. The old theology brings man to the Bible as authority, there to find his philosophy of life based on his duty to God. The new theology brings the Bible to men that they may determine how much, if any, they will receive and what disposition they will make of what they do receive. Communism is the theory of Darwin operating in the realm of government, based on the law of the jungle that "might makes right". It. is the soil in which the law of the herd replaces the law of individual responsibility to God.

Billy Sunday continued to say in his characteristic style: "They absorb everything but the truth. They deny everything but falsehood. They are tunnelling under our faith and homes and churches and government. A keg of powder in one hand and a fuse and a box of matches in the other, they are teaching our boys and girls in most of our schools and colleges that you have no mind. You have no soul. You are a piece of animal machinery, and you respond to the stimuli. In other words, there is no God. There is no devil. There is no Heaven. There is no hell. There is no right. There is no wrong There is nothing but you, and you are nothing but an animal descended from a monkey or a gorilla. What you want you have a right to have. Today the individual opinion is the seat of authority. I brand that numskull philosophy as anarchy, pure and simple." Disposing of faith in God after the plan of Modernism is the digging away of the foundations of the home, the Church, and constitutional government. Is that what is proposed here in America as they are doing it in Russia? We are traveling in that direction.
