MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENCE

Hartland M. S., Paulpietersburg, Natal, So. Africa

Dear Highway Folk:

Again a long time has passed since we last wrote; they have been busy months. Christmas feasts and special services are over, a quarterly is also history. We had splendid services during Christmas season and quarterly. Eight have been baptised and received into the church since last we wrote, one young man has been appointed as a probationery worker and a young woman the quarter before. Two deaths from our membership and one old man gave himself to the Lord and they all died happy in Jesus. One wedding already this new year, and two to take place this week. The attendance at the various Christmas feasts was exceptionally large—about six hundred, in spite of the fact that we had it on the same day as two other large local Christian feasts. The Outpost feasts varied from one to two hundred. The largest attendance of all was at Altona, there being no rival attractions elsewhere that day, between ten and eleven hundred were present. Two splendid services were held, one in the church and the other in open air at which we had our largest crowd of heathen. Despite that fact that this is the rainy season, we had good weather for all but one of our feasts . . . although it was 110 in the shade, we called it good weather the day I was down to Johan Kunane's by the Pevaan River. We had one "wet" feast (at Mbucu's). The other days it was about 90 in the shade. Most likely you in the Homeland had it below zero those days.

We can report victory along all lines, some aspects of the work are exceedingly encouraging. We have had some severe sickness in our ranks during our quarterly. Four of our preachers were unable to attend, as well as the Misses Sterritt, whom we missed very much from our quarterly.

Now we want to thank you for the way that you have stood by the Misses Sterritt. Miss Alice is again in Hospital, and expects to be there at least five weeks. The eye that has been operated on is doing well. The other is in so serious a condition that she must have treatment for ten days or two weeks before the doctor can operate. We trust that she may come out of this operation alright, but her condition is not nearly as encouraging as when the first operation took place. Sister Helen is in Durban with her. Even after her operation she will need a constant attendant for some weeks. They need your prayers at this time.

We had a very pleasant surprise from the Woodstock Church—a box of lovely gifts, each very useful for all five of us here, for which we wish to thank the kind givers. The Sterritt Sisters also had a nice box from that church, for which they are very grateful.

Pardon this crowded letter, much could be written on each of the subjects mentioned but time will not permit. In closing we wish to thank you all for your support of the past, and wish you a prosperous year, and trust that your winter season will see many souls saved in the Homeland, and the churches built up.
