RULES FOR YOUNG CONVERTS By M. McBrien

When the writer became a Christian fifteen years ago, although not included among those whom we term Young People, she would have found the following rules both helpful and edifying had she known them. They are intended for all "Babes in Christ," and if followed carefully they can be a help to keep yourselves in the love of God. All who love souls and desire to see them grow spiritually, have been grieved at times to see promising young converts, after the first excitement of their experience is over, became discouraged, listless, and half hearted, and then some day we miss them and find that they have backslidden. We might say that this is scriptural, that they were seed sown on rocky ground, but I am convinced that a little instruction might help them, and it is for this purpose that this artice is written

FIRST: Take a definite stand for God as soon as you know that your sins are forgiven. Step over from your old life into your new, and let your parents and friends know that you mean to serve God. This may seem hard but it pays, and stops the impulse to "dilly

dally." Leave off old friendships among the unsaved and make friends of God's children.

SECOND: Learn to pray; not necessarily in the phrases you hear others use, but learn to talk to Jesus; learn to tell your Heavenly Father about your needs, your joys, your hopes and aims. Take Jesus into the intimate things of your life. He is your friend as well as your personal Saviour. Have a place and appointed time to pray, and never let anything hinder you in keeping your appointments with Him.

THIRD: Read your Bible daily. Have a stated time set aside for this and try to get alone, away from things that will take your mind from what God wants to tell you through His word. Do not be in a hurry, and do not read too much at a time. A few verses read prayerfully and understood will help you more than the same number of chapters carelessly gone over. Ask God to help you understand as you read. The Bible is a Spiritual Book and is spiritually discerned.

FOURTH: The Christian life is a walk of faith. Sometimes after a series of good services things will lag, the meetings will seem different, you know you are still saved but you do not feel as joyful and full of zeal as before, and you will wonder what is wrong. Nothing is wrong. God is giving you your first lesson in faith. There is blessing and joy all along the Christian's life, but God must teach us to depend upon Him and not on our feelings. Feelings are not to be depended upon, but God is. Search your heart, trust in God, keep right on, and leave the feelings to Him. Do not let your feelings be your spiritual thermometer.

FIFTH: There may be a time when by some word or act you will grieve God, never for a moment meaning to. This will bring a feeling of darkness or heaviness over you, but God has arranged for this. He knows how frail we are. Jesus its our advocate. Send a prayer right up to Him and tell Him how sorry you are. He knows your heart and will re-instate you through His precious blood. Do not wait for a meeting or for your pastor to notice that something is wrong. Do not become a backslider; they are the most miserable people on earth.

SIXTH: Be useful to God. Get busy and you will be happy. Do not be afraid of responsibility. We are saved to serve. Testify, pray, teach, visit, take an office if given.

SEVENTH: Attend every service possible. Be a man, woman or child your pastor can depend upon. Be a lifter, and a blessing to your Church. Do not criticize your pastor; boost him, pray for him, believe in him.

Do all these and there will be few joyless days in your experience. God will honor you, and you will be an asset to your Church and community.

THE BOOK—AND OTHERS

No one but a rank infidel would dare to deny the fact that the Bible is the greatest book that the world has ever known. Many have been the attempts to give expression to its beauty and its worth, but all these are eclipsed by some of its own simple passages. One has said, "The Bible is a rock of diamonds, a chain of pearls, the sword of the Spirit; a chart by which the Christian sails to eternity; the map by which he daily walks; the sundial by which he sets his life; the balance in which he weighs his actions." But how much more meaningful are its own words: "Thy word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." "Thy word have I hid in my heart that I might not sin against Thee."
