

MISSIONARY CORRESPONDENCE

Dear Highway:

Again a long time is passed since our letters have crossed the ocean. This has been a very busy 'long time'. We can still report victory in our souls and the blessing of the Lord upon our work. I think it is sixteen or seventeen who have been baptized since last I wrote and a goodly number have given themselves to seek the Lord. The work is very encouraging.

We are entering the winter now with its great opportunities, confident that the Lord is going to give us a revival.

You will remember that a call came for money, forty pound (£40). Some one may be wondering why is it MacDonald is always calling for money. This forty pounds was called for entirely for the spread of the gospel. Twenty-five pounds of this would have freed four Native Evangelists from their six months' compulsory farm service and thus enable them to give their time to evangelistic work. Notice this money was not for their salary but to free them for the work of the Lord to which they would gladly have given their time could we have received the money to free them. The reply from the Board is there was no money when this request reached them. The rest of the money as asked for was for urgent need in the extension of this great work. Could you have heard the testimony of one of our men who farewelled today you would have felt as we and our Native Workers felt . . . Surely there should be some way to provide the money so this man could stay with us and help push the battle this winter. Other even more capable and spiritual workers must go to work just now when needed the most, for lack of funds. Surely there is some one, a friend of souls, you may not be a friend of our Denomination, but you are a friend of souls and you believe in the work that our Denomination is doing, and you have some money which you feel He would have you invest for Him in such a work (if such there be—and I believe that there are such) write to Brother L. T. Sabine, our treasurer, and tell him that you would like to free one or two of our young Evangelists at Thirty Dollars per year. I am sure that the Lord would bless and reward you with souls for doing so. I know that there are many dear friends both in our Denomination and out of it who would like to help in this way, but can not. We are deeply grateful for every bit that you are doing. We know that from the very first this work has been supported and maintained by continual sacrifice and faith.

We recognize that the Board can do only what you enable them to do by your support. We want to thank all for their support, and particularly for the gifts toward the passage fund, which leads us to believe that our so greatly needed reinforcements are soon to come. We rejoice also in the good reports from your evangelistic efforts in the Homeland, and pray that the Lord's blessing may continually rest upon you in all your labours for Him.

Dear Highway Friends:—

Some time ago I was about to make an appeal for funds for Home Missions, when our President of the Foreign Missionary Society issued his stirring appeal. I felt it to be unwise at that particular time to make any further appeal, or to in any way interfere with the programme but rather to assist in any possible way. But I do feel that between now and alliance we should make a strong effort to raise funds for homeland needs.

Has it ever occurred to you that we have in the homeland some valiant soldiers of the cross who are existing on meagre pittances of in some cases at least less than three hundred dollars for

a year? We should help them, not with a mere five dollars a month as the case has been but with a real substantial increase to what they receive on these needy fields. To do this we must raise more funds than has been our custom. We can do it. We would have done it perhaps if we had given the matter more consideration as a people.

Then, too, has it occurred to you that our tents should be busy. It is rather hard to say to a man with a family, here is a tent take it and go, without standing behind him in a practical way not only with our prayers but with our means.

We need funds to do this. I am fully persuaded that the folk who gave so liberally toward the pressing needs of the foreign field cause do fully as well in connection with these urgent needs in the homeland.

Let us make the appeal in our churches, brethren, the future of our work depends upon it.
