## THE PROBLEM OF MISFITS AND ITS SOLUTION

What is a misfit? A misfit is an individual who has either attempted a task beyond his ability or one who has failed in the efficient use of his talents in attacking the task of which he is capable. In either case failure to a lesser or greater degree is the result.

But once in my experience have I heard a man say that regardless of inherent talents, industry and determination would place the attainments and accomplishments of one within the reach of all. And he had just completed, or perhaps I should say terminated, his freshman year in college, and was a freshman indeed. One can hardly cross the threshold of life before he is forced to realize his own limitations, even though admittance of the fact is rare. Many and varied are the abilities of mankind. The Jack of all trades is master of none.

Too many times we are prone to measure success by the size of one's bank account, the valuation of one's real estate or the list of one's stocks and bonds, but such a standard is utterly false.

If the talents and abilities of man are varied and surrounded by certain human limitations it would appear that any definite achievement would be impossible as the mea-

sure of one's success. No, the measure of success is not what we do nor what we attain—it is rather what we do or attain compared with what we might have done. Efficiency, then, is the measure of individual success.

Thus we are brought face to face with the tremendous task of choosing a pathway of life of which we are capable and yet a pathway that will extend our every talent to attain. This is the bed-rock of our problem, which when solved affords us a safe basis for life and character building. But how can we be sure in this vital choice? Our hope and security is in God alone, the one to whom we are indebted for our talents, the one who holds the blueprint for our lives. The quest for true success and character outside the will and plan of God for our lives is a futile one.

The true purpose of Christian education is to assist youth in making this vital choice that will place them in the plan of God and then prepare them to efficiently perform the service that is theirs. Thus in a very definite way Christian education offers assurance of personal and national prosperity. In this connection may I quote from the words of Roger W. Babson in his most excellent pamphlet on Christian education? Mr. Babson says, "Christian education can insure what no corporation can insure, namely, prosperity." Thus to a character-building institution, yea, to Christian education alone, can we hope to look for a solution of the problem of misfits.

### NEW WINE AND OLD BOTTLES

Christ was endeavoring to teach his disciples the "more excellent way" of establishing the Kingdom of God upon the earth when He related to them the already known fact new wine must always be put into new bottles. This was necessary in those days in order to save both the wine and the bottles, for the old containers, made from the skins of animals and dried hard with age, could not stand the strain caused by the fermenting process of the new wine. Christ was saying to them that the old forms and customs of the law were insufficient for the new dispensation, and inadequate channels through which to pour out the Holy Spirit upon the world. They had served their time and had done it well, but they were worn out and must be laid aside. More than that, they had been overtaxed, being expected to do more than they were intended for, and at heart the people had lost faith in them. The means used to spread the gospel and get souls saved must always be sufficient and efficient to meet the needs of the day at hand, both from the standpoint of God's manner of revelation, and the particular demands put upon them by the needs of the people being dealt with.

Sometimes the thought comes to us why our work for the Lord is not more effectual. Many and varied are the reasons. Almost universally will come the answer that what we need is more of God's Spirit and Blessing. But we do get blessed, and God comes down in such a way that we marvel that people are not saved by the score. Every Quarterly Meeting and every Camp Meeting, to say nothing of regular services and revival meetings, have the same echoing lament to the fact that people will not yield to the Lord, and we blame
