## WESLEY ON PERFECT LOVE

It is the 'loving the Lord his God with all his heart, and with all his soul, and with all his mind.' This is the sum of Christian perfection; it is all comprised in that one word, love. The first branch of it is the love of God; and as he that loves God loves his brother also, it is inseparably connected with the second. 'Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself'; thou shalt love every man as thy own soul, as Christ loved us. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets; these contain the whole of Christian perfection." Wesleyan Methodist.

## THE REFUGE OF PRAYER

Abraham Lincoln said concerning this theme: "I have been driven many times to my knees by the overwhelming conviction that I had nowhere else to go. My own wisdom and that of all about me seemed insufficient for that day." And on persevering in prayer the story is told in the life of Bishop Matthew Simpson, who was called into counsel at times by Mr. Lincoln, that at one time of great darkness and distress during the war, they took the problems of the nation to God in prayer, and the Bishop said, "We prayed around twice." "Praying around" is a term familiar in early Methodism when united prayer and persevering prayer was made in regular procedure around the circle, a most excellent plan on certain occasions.

"The name of the Lord is a strong tower, the righteous runneth into it and is safe." Blessed place of refuge and strength! May this name be often on the lips of God's people, breathed forth in prayer, in the manifold ministry of this great provision of the heavenly Father.—Wesleyan Methodist.
