Dear Folk:

Just another of these rambling letters, where one tries in a short space to include a lot.

We trust that this will find you all enjoying the blessing of the Lord, whether in sickness or in good health. His blessings are not confined to good health, as we have learned through the years that have gone, through all the perplexities and trials. We do however trust that this finds many of you well, and that the New Year will mean a year of blessing to you. We can report victory here in many ways, if not in all ways, the year that is past is one of our best since coming to this country.

We have much to be thankful for, first that the Bubonic Plague which has been very deadly in a neighbouring province has not come to either Transvaal or Natal. It seems it is almost certain death, as no one reported as sick of this plague has recovered. We have also had typhus right in our district, eighteen deaths in all, two nembers of our church. This scourge seems to be abating. We are very grateful for the manner in which the Government has assisted in combating this, too, as well as for the manner in which they are assisting us in combating Malaria, which will be at its worst in the next two months. We are also very grateful for the progress made in our church work in general, and in some Piaces in particular. If the Sister who had sent the money to free from compulsory farm service could have heard today, the report given by one freed by her gift, she certainly would have relt well repaid for any effort or sacrifice she has made. Other reports are equally encouraging from those so freed, of souls being saved, and of those who have already believed strengthened in their faith. We are thankful for the progress our schools have been making. The four schools run this year will approximate about one hun dred and fifty. We are rejoicing particularly because the Government has assisted this year in the payment of the teacher at Hartland, and is now taking over the superintending and support of the teacher. We will have to equip our school with furniture, subjects to the approval of the Government, which will mean quite an expense for the first year on our part, nevertheless we are grateful for all the blessings enumerated, and many more not here mentioned.

We are looking forward to the coming of reinforcements which should be on their way before this reaches you, and we pray that this may be only the beginning of reinforcements, for many more are needed. We are very grateful for the support that we have had in the past, both your prayers and offerings and trust that the blessing of the Lord which maketh rich and addeth no sorrow, may be yours.
