Two, only, other passengers, a man and wife who go as far as Cape Town.

They call at Free Town, Serra Feau, West Africa, Cape Town, Port Elizabeth and East London on their way up to Durban, where Grace and Charley expect to be met by our son, George and son-in-law, Mr. MacDonald. Then, too, we have friends who have invited them to stop a few days before finishing their journey to Hartland.

This boat's crew consists of 52 members and the sailors are mostly West African Negroes. I was talking with one of them but he could not speak Zulu.

Our meetings in Saint John were richly blessed by the presence of the Lord and some found help.

The parting held its heartaches but "My grace is sufficient" was proved to still be unfailing. We miss them everywhere, their influence is as a sweet perfume wherever they had been. We realize more than ever what it cost God to love the world SO much that He gave His only begotten Son. How He must have missed Jesus! But God gave that we might be saved so we can give, that the heathen might be saved.
