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EDITORIAL

LET US DO OUR PART

There is no class of individuals that should be more enthusiastic regarding the plan of the establishment of a denominational school than the young people. The idea contains the promise of a provision for our education under character-building environment, at a minimum cost, and at a location comparatively near our homes.

Every young person should aspire to a thorough academic training. The development of the mind contributes largely to our appreciation of life and is a necessary qualification for service in a world of rational beings. Uneducated, one enters into life halt and maimed, and is deplorably incapacitated for usefulness in the broad and challenging field of life. The value of a thoroughly trained Christian mind cannot be fully estimated. The essential contribution that such training makes toward the preparation of an individual for the successful discharge of life's task of duty cannot be overlooked.

What can the young people do to assist in the successful promotion of the plan that contains such promise of benefit to them? How can we contribute to the solution of this crisis problem?

May we offer these few suggestions as answers to the above queries.

First, we can help by making the plan a subject of interest to our Young People's Societies. If each one of our various groups determined to labour to make a contribution to the "School Fund" the total amount would greatly assist in the launching of the scheme. Recently one of our young people asked the question, "Do you know of any company from which I may obtain mottoes, books, or something of that nature that I may have my young people sell them and offer the profits as a contribution to the School Fund? This seemed a fine idea, and something of this nature could be taken up by all our societies. Who will be the first of our young people's societies to make a contribution? Which group will lead the way?

Second, we will help greatly by taking a personal interest in attending the school. If we are beginning or about to begin High School work, let us consider attending our own school and reap the benefit of good teaching on the Word of God as well as enjoying the fellowship of Christian teachers and students. Send your name into the committee, either the editor of the Highway or the editor of the young people's page, and list yourself as a prospective student.

Third, we can help much by making the matter a subject of prayer. No one will deny that the proposed plan presents a challenging task and to attempt it without the sure help of God would mean miserable and disheartening failure. But if God is with us, we cannot fail. If He supports the plan, it will surely prosper. And so let us pray definitely, earnestly, and importunately that God will lead us to glorious victory to the praise of His name!

We will publish in our young people's page the account of money received from our young folks. It will be noted that the former secre-

tary of our Association set a good example for us by making a personal contribution of \$25.00. What Society will be the first to respond, and which group will make the largest contribution to this worthy project?
