Dear Brother Dow and "Highway" Friends:

I am sending you a short sketch of the Colporteur Work I did with the New Brunswick Bible Society during the months of last summer and fall of 1936.

I attended Beulah Camp Meetings as usual for twelve days. After that I travelled with car through the south and west portions of Queens, Sunbury, York and Carleton counties. Commencing at Welsford and travelling along the highway and bye roads leading from Welsford to Harvey Station, along the C. P. Railway, calling at all the homes and new settlers' Camps at Clarendon, Wirral, Ridge Road, Sand Brook, South Oromocto, Lake Road, Juvenile, Boyne Road, Mill Settlement, South Branch, Patterson Settlement, Hoyt Station, Blissville, Bailey, Meadow Brook Road, Fredericton Junction, Three Tree Creek, Diamond Square Road, Tracey, Traceyville, Beaver Dam, Rusagornis, Nasonworth, Charter Settlement, New Maryland, Wassis, Rooth, Cork, Acton, Hanwell, Harvey Station, South Tweedside, Magaguadavic, Back Road, Harvey Lake, Mangundy, Blaney Ridge, Smithfield,

New Market, Lake George, Pokiok Road, No. 2 Highway along through Long Creek, Prince William to Meductic, also Allandale, Charlie Lake Settlement, Dovington Ridge, Johnston Settlement, Dow Settlement, Crow Hill, Creek Road, Canterbury Maine, Carroll Ridge, Porton, Scott's Settlement, Benton, Teeds Mills, Plymouth, Connel Road, Hartford, No. 5 Highway, Richmond and Mackenzie Corner, Red Bridge, Briggs Mills, Watson Settlement, Belleville, Lindsay Green Road, Union Corner, Debec, Elmwood, Speerville, Oak Mountain to Eel River, Kirkland, Monument, Mapledale, Verdun, Maxwell, Golden Ridge, Eel River Lake, North Lake, Fosterville, Balm of Gilead, Pemberton (Forest City, N. B.), also Victoria Settlement, French Lake, Woodland and Geary, making in all 2900 calls, selling and distributing 512 Bibles, 265 Testaments 1651 portions and gospels, making a total of 2428 pieces of Scripture.

I found 16 families without any Bible or Testament, and most of them not able to buy. To these families I gave Bibles.

On account of the much rainy, cold weather in October, my work was somewhat hindered. I finished up on November 5th.

Recent letters from Africa give us food for deep thought and should stir us to do our utmost. "In the near future, we are to have a greater opportunity than ever. In all probability, twenty-five or thirty thousand more natives will soon be settled around us, which will mean added responsibility and opportunity. We now have about three thousand. It is bound to increase our medical work, increase our school work and, we trust, our church We expect to have a Week of Prayer in our as a whole. We trust to do our best to reach these needy souls.

"Some of you will remember five years ago when twenty or thirty demon possessed were delivered in answer to prayer. This was a most remarkable victory, for we have seen very little of demon possession since then . . . the moving in of thousands more of natives into this district will probably bring numbers of demon doctors and demon possessed among us again, etc., etc."

The above is quoted from a letter from Faith.

Our European workers rejoice in the soon going to them of two young helpers in Charley and Grace, but with the coming home of the Starritt Sisters, they will still be so short handed to carry on the work we now have there, then see the great host to be worked among when these added numbers of natives are moved off of farms in the district, to a large tract of land, about "ten miles in every direction from the Mission Station at Hartland." (quotation). Our opportunity is large, wonderfully so right at our doorsnot in Equatorial Africa, with greater expense to enter it-but where we can use the church we have, the school, the hospital, for a beginning, but workers, much more are needed everywhere in all departments of the mission work European spirit-filled workers to guide and help many more native evangel-

It is our work, beloved, if we will have it

What shall we do? How can we do more than we are doing now?

Jesus said: "Lift up your eyes and look, for the fields are already white unto the harvest. Pray ye, therefore, the Lord of the harvest that He will thrust forth laborers unto His harvest." "Ask of me and I will give thee the heathen for thine inheritance." Do we want that kind? Shall we pray? God help us and cause us to open our eyes to see, then use the faith we have so as to increase it, and prepare to go, to send, to give, to pray.
