DENIES RICH TWO PER CENT CONTROL WEALTH

William J. Cameron, of the Ford Motor Company, in a recent radio address, characterized as "mischievous" the assertion that "the rich two per cent of the people own eighty or ninety per cent of the wealth.

"In 1929 the largest single block of wealth, twenty-two per cent of the whole, was dwellings, the homes of people, valued at \$102,000,-000,000," he said. "The next in volume of wealth were the farms at \$58,000,000,000 or twelve per cent. of the whole. Nevt comes personal property—clothing, household furnishings, jewelry, automobiles—amounting to \$49,500,-000,000. All recognize that ownership of these is almost entirely with individuals."

Cameron said that of the "25,000,000 houses and lots in this country, 17,000,000 are owned by their occupants. * * * * In cities seventy per cent of this property is free of mortgage. * * * Of the 6,000,000 farms, 3,500,000 are owned by the men who operate them."

Mortgaged farms in 1930, he said, were worth \$21,000,000,000, but the mortgages were less than \$7,000,000,000, with farmers holding about thirty per cent of this mortgage claim themselves. The farmers' debt in 1933 was in better shape than the government or corporation debt." Declaring that the \$50,000,000,000 in personal property is almost wholly owned by its users. Cameron cited the 25,000,000 automobiles in the country as an example. Including investments in stock, Cameron said that almost three-fourths of this wealth is in the hands of individuals.

He concluded, however, by saying that there was not enough wealth in the country and that it was our pressing job to create more of it.— Evangelical Messenger.
