## CHINA IN FIGURES

The Methodist Board of Foreign Missions gives the following interesting figures:

China's recorded history dates to 2205 B. C. Its area is 4,277,000 square miles.

The population is estimated at 400,800,000, 346,000 foreigners live in China.

The density of population in China is 174 persons to the square mile; in the U. S. A. it is 35.

There are 8,000,000 Chinese living outside of China.

China has 2,150 miles of coast and 89 ports. Peking, Shanghai, Hankow and Hangchow have each more than 1,000,000 people; Nanking, the new capital, has 390,000.

341,000,000 acres of China are cultivated.

China exports to the U. S. A. yearly silk valued at about \$80,000,000.

The average crop of rice is 3,750,000 tons per year.

China's 350,000,000 hens lay 26,250,000,000 eggs per year; most of the eggs are exported.

China's yearly trade with the U. S. A. is about \$83,000,000 in imports and \$151,000,000 in exports.—Selected.
