THE REVIVAL WE NEED

That a great revival of Christianity is needed is conceded by Christian ministers and laymen, prominent business men, leading financiers and able statesmen, and all agree that is is either "revival or ruin" for the church of the nation, and for the nation itself. It is not a question to be discussed but it is important that we realize the kind of revival essential in the present crisis.

The revival needed is both destructive and constructive. Rubbish must be removed before building operations can be successfully undertaken. As a destructive agency, the revival needed today must end Sabbath desecration, with which most of the general lawlessness began. It must solidify the Christian vote, so that only Christian, or highest class of moral men, can be elected to office. It must destroy "the works of the devil" by casting his tools into the fire, stop stock, and all other kind of gambling, and cause men and women to walk in God's highway of holiness, instead of hopping voluptuously in tune with the devil's jazz. It must blot out the unclean movies, which are one of the chief causes of youthful profligacy and incentive to crime. It must end prize fighting and football games, for these are equally brutal, and the latter result in more fatalities than the former. It must stop divorce which is usually only another name for legalized adultery. It must banish prenatal murders and punish the murderers. It must secure the enforcement of all laws by the speedy punishment of offenders, whether they are speeding statesmen and officials, or bootleggers, or gangsters. It must drive godless ministers back to Christ or out of the Christian pulpits, and wicked men in the church to penitence or out of their official positions. In its constructive relation it must produce changed characters. "Except a man be born again he cannot see the kingdom of God." It must produce, not reformation, but regeneration. It must result in confession and forsaking of sins, repentance toward God and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, and restitution for wrongs done to our fellow men. It must rebuild the family altars, now lying in ruins. It must open the gates of praise, till every Christian heart shall hear the joy bells chiming within, and every Christian home shall become vocal with the praise of God and His Christ. It must bring again the desire for worship which shall crowd the pews of the Church twice every Lord's Day, bring the children back to interested attendance at Sunday School, and throng the prayer meeting with those who love Christ and delight in His worship, and enjoy the fellowship of kindred saints who are making their upward climb toward God and Home.

It must awaken a new love for the Word of God, so that it shall be "more desired than gold, yea, than much fine gold; sweeter also than the droppings of the honeycomb." It must awaken a longing to win for Christ the souls for whom He died, and will teach us to sing each morning as we enter a new day:

"Bless me, Lord, and make me a blessing,

I'll gladly Thy message convey;

Use me to help some poor needy soul,

And make me a blessing today."

SALVATION THROUGH THE LAMB

"The figure of a lamb slain is common, both to the Old and New Testament story of redemption. Nature and grace seem to blend harmoniously in this emblem of Salvation through sacrifice.

"High up on the old German church of Werden is carved the image of a lamb, concerning which the villagers tell this story. Many years ago a mason was at work on the portion of wall where this figure now stands, when the cord by which his plank seat was suspended snapped, and he was hurled down to what seemed instant death, for rough masses of stone lay on the ground below, the building being under repair. He arose from his fall, however, unhurt, for there amongst the stone heaps a little lamb had been nibbling at scanty tufts of herbage, and on this animal he had fallen safely and softly, while the lamb lay crushed to death. The man so strangely saved had the monument erected on the wall of the church in grateful, lasting memory of his deliverance from a cruel death, and of the innocent creature to whom he owed it."—Christian Witness.
