"Let no man despise thy youth"—I. Timothy 4-12

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JESUS, THE MODEL YOUTH Read Luke 2:41-52

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The period of adolescence, from the age of 12 to 15 is of prime importance in the development of an individual. The person undergoes great physical changes, enters his mental heritage, bears a new relation to society and to God (verse 52). Following this period the great choices of life are made; friends, the life companion, the vocation, and in about 90% of cases, the ultimate moral choice. The personality is more or less fluid but it is fitting into moulds which are seldom broken.

For such a vital period it has been divinely ordered that we should have an example. For a space of 29 years the only picture given us of Jesus is one presenting Him as He enters this period of life. He was like other youth with this notable exception: He was without sin. Hence, we may safely follow Him.

He was passing from childhood to youth and manhood. He took advantage of every opportunity for His own development and the edification of others. He chose His company with this in view. WHILE HE MIGHT HAVE BEEN PLAYING WITH THE CHILDREN HE WAS SITTING WITH THE DOCTORS. Furthermore, HE was HEARING them. He had the humble attitude of a learner. With this attitude in life one is sure to develop. He asked questions. The curiosity of His youth concerned the things of His Father. Does yours? "Be wise unto that which is good and simple concerning evil." They marvelled at His wisdom. He was coming into possession of that Divine Wisdom which caused men in later years to say, "Never man spake as this Man."

"Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" He was becoming conscious of His life task. The vision of His life work was opening before Him. Is yours? Surely your aim is not just to make a living! Have a purpose, have a goal! Be sure it is your Heavenly Father's business. SPEND YOUR LIFE FOR HIS GLORY. Note the imperativeness: "I MUST be." A great task calls for great determination. Are you cultivating such? Verse 51: "He was subject unto His parents." Obedience to one's earthly parents is a splendid prelude to obedience to God in a life work. They are not contradictory. Verse 52-Then follows the great development on right principles. Follow Jesus and you can say with satisfaction at the end of your life concerning God's work for you, "It is finished."

"In the Steps of the Master" By H. V. Morton
