"Imitation of Christ"

The "Imitation of Christ," authorship of which is popularly ascribed to Thomas A. Kempis, has been published in some six thousand. editions and in fifty languages, yielding place in. order of popularity to no other book save the Bible in the Christian world. This book is perhaps the richest religious classic that has ever been presented to the Christian world by man, and its substance impresses the reader to believe. that it was born in an atmosphere of deep piety. "A serious mind," wrote John Wesley in his preface to the edition he prepared, "will never be sated with it, though it were read a thousand times over; for those general principles are the seeds of meditation, the stores they contain are never exhausted. And herein it greatly resembles the Holy Scriptures, that under the plainest words, there is divine hidden virtue, continually flowing into the soul of a pious reader, and by the blessing of God transforming it into His image." If you are seeking to cultivate a spirit of deep spirituality within your soul, this priceless gem of literature will greatly assist you to that sacred end.

who pities himself. One would rather not be near a person of that sort. I remember a young man who attended the same mission I did. He was continually getting saved and backsliding, and I discovered that self-pity was the cause of his repeated backsliding. He would keep company with. various young ladies, and would fall in love with each of them, but could not keep them very long. This of course wounded him, and as a result he would give over to self-pity, grow very melancholy, and backsliding was the next item on his program. You who pity yourself and sulk, are: very disgusting to those around you. 3. Self-pity is very characteristic of folk who have been spoiled by their parents. They have been over-indulged, and when not treated the same by those outside the family (and of course they won't be), they pout about it. It is tragedy that young people are spoiled. If their parents. only realized how disgusting they are to the outside world! Spoiled people have it inculcated in their brain that the world revolves about them, because their parents treated them so, and when they are not so treated by ousiders, it hurts them very much. It is always hard to get a spoiled child established in the grace of God. 4. Self-pitying people will excuse their breaking of God's commands. "The Lord is too good to punish me for doing a little thing like that," says one. "The Lord does not expect me to pay the tithe when I have so many other obligations to meet," says another. "The Lord will not condemn me for using tobacco. I have used it so long now I can't get along without it," says a self-pitying tobacco user. These and other excuses are made by those who pity and pet themselves in excuses they make for their sins. 5. Self-pitying is carnal, and if carnal, it is enmity against God. Therefore it is unchristian. So why harbor this enemy of God in your breast? As long as it is us, then there is something in us that belongs to the devil. Confess it to God, and forsake it like any other sin; let us resist the temptation to pity ourselves as we would resist the devil, for it makes us childish,

THE EVIL OF SELF-PITY

Most of us are tempted to pity ourselves when things seem to be going against us; those who are carnal will usually yield to the temptation. There is a difference between being tempted and yielding to temptation. There are a number of rasons why one should fight against the sin of self-pity.

1. Self-pity is very childish. I remember as a child that other children had toys I was not able to enjoy, and went to places I could not go. When these conditions would arise I would often sit around and sulk. I did not try to hide my injury from others, but rather, I wanted them to see it. I wanted others to pity me. Everyone that pities himself wants everyone else to pity him. What right has a professing Christian to sit around like a baby and pity himself? Do we testify to being rich in grace, though poor in worldly goods? Why, then, should we descend to pity ourselves as do children? If we do such, we are yet babes in Christ, and are carnal.

2. Self-pity is disgusting. There is nothing manly about a man who pities himself. Christians are supposed to be real men and women; but there is something disgusting about a person

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
