It is purely the hand of Providence, and by the blessing of Providence, I must struggle to take it as such, in which case it will not be loss but gain * * * Do not pity me. Regard me rather as a runner that, though tripped down, will not lie there but run and run again."

Carlyle created a work even greater than the first promised to be.—Forward.
