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#### EDITORIAL

#### SACRIFICE

And if ye offer the blind for sacrifice, is it not evil? And if ye offer the lame and the sick, is it not evil? Offer it now to thy governor: Will he be pleased with thee, or accept thy person? saith the Lord of hosts. Mal. 1-8. Because man had sinned and broken God's law, Justice demanded that he should die; but mercy provided a substitute in our Lord Jesus Christ who died in man's place, and therefore made salvation possible to all who believe on him. Therefore as an expression of our faith in the sacrifice of Jesus, God ordained that man should offer clean beasts in sacrifice to him which was done from the beginning, for we read that when the two sons of Adam went to worship they offered sacrifice to God: but Cain's sacrifice was rejected because it lacked the blood of a clean beast which Abel offered as a symbol of his faith in the atoning blood of Jesus our Redeemer, and which was accepted by God, and by which he obtained witness that he was righteous. God testifying of his gifts. That was long before the days of Moses who by divine authority gave the children of Israel many laws concerning offerings and sacrifices; but previous to the giving of the law by Moses we read that not only Adam and his sons offered sacrifices, but also Noah and his descendants, Abraham and his posterity, Job and Melchizedek offered sacrifices to God. Alexander Cruden says that a sacrifice differed from an ordinary offering in this, that in a sacrifice there must be a real change or destruction of the thing offered, whereas an oblation is but a simple offering of a gift. This explains why Cain's offering was rejected. He offered only the fruits of the ground which did not involve the sacrifice of a life as did Abel's offering, hence could not be a type of the suffering and death of Jesus, which every sacrifice acceptable to God represented. There were two other things necessary to a sacrifice. One was, it must be a willing offering, and also of first quality. No second rate victim such as a blind, or blemished, or sick animal was accepted. It was because the Jews were using inferior animals for sacrifice in Malachi's day that God brought the charge against them found in our text, and pronounced a curse upon them instead of a blessing. Evidently they were like many people of our time who seem to think that any little thing they do for the Lord's cause is acceptable to him. Any little money, or time that they have left over after their own interests are served they give to the Lord. Well, the Lord would not accept

such offerings in Malachi's day and why should he today? This may explain why so many professors of religion have so little blessing on their souls. The Apostle Paul in writing to the Church at Rome, said, I beseech you, brethren, by the mercies of God that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service.

Note, their sacrifice was to be a living sacrifice. Whereas the death of Jesus was the great antitype of all the lives of clean beasts, offered before his crucifixion, and the last and only life given that could meet the demand of justice, or atone for man's sin, then the only sacrifices acceptable to God since the crucifixion of Jesus would be living sacrifices, or lives redeemed by the blood of Jesus, and given to him in consecration to be spent in his service and for his glory. This is what the apostle calls "our reasonable service." The spirit of sacrifice has characterized the service of the followers of Jesus in all ages. Now to come a little nearer to where we all live, let us ask this question: How much sacrifice is there in our service these days? In other words do we put the needs of God's cause before our own? Do we give, and do for the cause of Christ until we really suffer? When we read of the sacrifice made by the early church: How they sold their houses and lands and gave the money to support poor Christians, and in addition to that, because of their testimony for Jesus they were persecuted, beaten, imprisoned, stoned, and wandered about in sheep skins and goat skins, in dens and caves of the earth, and were put to death in every cruel way., and rejoiced because they were counted worthy to suffer for His sake. And when we contrast their experiences with the lives of the professing Christians of our day, who live in luxury in finely furnished, and comfortable homes, wear fine clothing, pay more for a pair of stockings than their mothers and grandmothers would pay for a dress; patronize the beauty shops, getting permanents and spending money enough in just trying to look pretty, to support a native preacher in Africa or some other foreign land to carry the gospel to thousands who have never heard it. We want to ask, Where is the spirit of sacrifice which characterized those followers of Christ in past days? Of course we know there are some good people yet who do without some things that would add to their comfort for the sake of giving more to the cause of Christ; but not very many of us I fear are really giving or serving in a sacrificial spirit. I am thinking that if the long lost spirit of sacrifice could again be restored to the church of Christ, then we might again lift up Christ in that sacrificial spirit which would draw men unto him.
