CHOOSING

Today we wish to consider the principles of right choosing as drawn from a comparison of the choices of Lot and Moses. Gen. 13:11. Then Lot chose him all the plain of Jordon. Heb. 11:24-26: By faith, Moses, when he was come to years, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter; choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season; esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt: for he had respect unto the recompense of the reward.

The comparison is not of a sinner and a saint for Lot was a righteous man—at least in his later life. (2 Pet. 2:7). But that the choice was not motivated by as lofty princi-

ples as that of Moses is clear from the results.

Lot's choice was determined by what he saw with the natural eye. The hilly country to the left finally rising to a lofty ridge skirting the eastern coast of the Mediterranean made little or no appeal to him. The beautiful well-watered plain allured him. Moses chose, not by sight, but by faith. He knew God's promises to the children of Abraham and he embraced them.

Lot chose for the present but Moses had the future in view as well. He had respect unto the recompense of the reward.

Lot chose for self. It mattered not to him that his aged uncle Abraham would have to dig wells to water his herds. Moses chose for others. He beheld the affliction of God's people and longed to aid in their deliverance.

Lot chose for ease. The plain was like the garden of the Lord. Moses chose the task which God had for him. Acts 7:25, "He supposed his brethren would have understood how that God by his hand would deliver them."

Lot chose for material advantage. Moses chose for spiritual enlargement. "Esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt." The worst that could befall him for the sake of Christ was more valuable than all the riches of a great civilization accessible to a prince.

Which were the better principles should be decided in the light of the results. Lot pitched his tent toward Sodom. Soon he was in the wicked city Perhaps he was the mayor for he sat in the gate. Once he was taken as a prisoner of war. If he thought to convert Sodom he failed miserably. Then destruction came. The Sodomites whom his daughters had married mocked the warning. As a fugitive he was led from the city. His wife, whose heart was really in Sodom, looked back and was turned to a pillar of salt. Bereaved and having lost his wealth he spent his last days. A negative quality in history—he warns rather than inspires.

Moses, on the other hand, gained great enrichment of soul. God talked to him 'mouth to mouth.' "As meek as Moses" is a proverb. He delivered God's people from bondage. As mediator of a covenant with God he laid the foundation of the true worship of Jehovah. The laws he brought form the basis of justice to this day. Much more could be said. The last picture we have of him is with Elijah on the mount speaking with Jesus of His decease.

He might have become king of Egypt. But he became greater. He gave us more of our Bible than any other man. His life is an inspiration.

Then the principles on which he based his choosing must be those worthy of adoption. Shall we make ours? Amen.
