Natal, So. Africa, Nov. 12th, 1937

Dear Highway Friends:

Once again we greet you from Africa. And while it may seem early at this date, when this reaches you it will be time to give you our Christmas greetings. We trust that this may be a joyous Christmas to you all, and that in the exchange of greetings of the Season, you may feel the Presence of the Greatest Gift to mankind.

We are very conscious of His presence in our midst. We believe that many more know Him in the true sense of the word than did a year ago in this place. We have much to rejoice our hearts in the marked spirituality of many of our leaders and people here. Many show such a clear conception of things spiritual and evidence of growth in grace, and a great desire to press forward.

The Christmas message holds sway here; particularly in our church the love of Christ and the love of His Word is increasingly manifested. While we think of you in the Homeland and would rejoice to be with you at this Christmas tide, to renew acquaintances, yet we would not exchange places with you. We believe we are here in Divine order, and while there are times when the longing for the fellowship and presence of the dear home folk comes stealing in to our hearts, yet we have wonderful fellowship with these, our chosen people.

We have seen wonderful victories during the past year, we have been sadly disappointed in some who have been attracted by the things of the world and disobeyed the Lord, but the victories have been far greater than the defeats or failures.

We want to thank the Lord for the reinforcements that have come to us since last year, for the way the Lord is using both Charles and Grace here and George at Altona. While two have come, two have gone home, and we pray the Lord may bless them in the homeland and pray the Lord may make it mean all it should both to them and to you.

There are many things which the Sterritt Sisters did which George Sanders can not do over at Altona, yet he has some advantages over them. First, being much younger, he can stand long horseback journeys much better, as well as long trips on bicycle and on foot. He is out on the field almost constantly and is standing it quite well, and he is loved by the people. Especially the young men are being stirred up to seek the Lord. Now if you went to his house you might think he needs a wife or a mother to look after him, nevertheless he is happy in the will of the Lord there. We rethere that the Government is granting him a there that he Government is granting him a native malaria assistant, who is starting in over there next week and will make his headquarters at Altona M. S. and devote his whole time to the fighting of malaria, treatment of patients and training of the natives in this

This has been a long-felt need. In addition to this, the supplying of free Quinine by the Government to the natives means a great deal. The Sterritt Sisters had to buy Quinine at the rate of about four dollars an ounce up to the last year when the Government supplied it at half price. For the past five

years we have had a fine Spiritual young N. M. A. on this Mission Station and we know a little of what it has done for our district.

There is also the possibility of the monthly visit of the District Surgeon at the Mission Station. At Altona also the Government is taking over the support of the Native School teacher, possibly next term. This is another expense which the Sterritt Sisters bore which may be taken off George's shoulders.

Now a word about ourselves. We thank the Lord for improvement in health in the last year. We thank the Lord for your financial support in the last year—a greatly needed help. It is, however, just a matter of casting your bread upon the waters. The first four years we were in this country we spent an average of from three hundred and fifty to four hundred dollars per year in this medical work here, which we consider is absolutely indispensable to this Mission work. Since 1935 we receive Government aid, which covers most of the expense of this Medical work. Had we failed to do this, there would be no medical work here today. This important branch of the work would have died, but because of our sacrifice and conformity to Government requirements today you are receiving from the Government five hundred dollars per year to carry your (and our) Medical Mission work.

When we came out here I was placed in charge of the Medical work which at that time was receiving fifty pounds per year, Government aid. This aid, however, was cut off the year we came, on account of a new regulation which demanded the undertaking of the training of Native nurses which we could not attempt.

Much more could be said, but time and space forbid. We want to thank you for the money which was sent to help defray Faith's Hospital expense, which is entered in the Minutes as six hundred dollars. We did receive this amount, and what we did receive was not all for this time, but for the expense of 1934, which we had not been able to meet. When we appealed for help, they sent money to pay this old bill. Later they sent us another hundred dollars toward this new bill and asked us for a statement of the present expense which we sent them. This last one was three hundred and ten dollars. We are sorry that our calls have been so many and so great.

With every good wish for you all during the Christmas season and the blessing of the Lord upon the New Year.
