Dear Brother Dow:

Editor the King's Highway, Moncton, N.B.

I am sending you a brief report of the colportage work I did in 1937. I had charge of the Bible stand at Beulah Camp Meetings in July for 12 days. My distribution of Scripture Bibles, etc., was considerable more at the camp meetings this year than in any previous year since I have had this work, nine years.

After camp meetings I did colportage work in parts of Kings, Queens, Sunbury and York Counties, making 2,514 calls, distributing 426 Bibles, 240 Testaments, 1360 portions of Scripture, making a total distribution of 2,026 pieces of Scripture valued at \$433.15.

During my work I found 16 families destitute of Scripture. These families I supplied with Bibles. I have to say this work of distributing God's Word is a great work owned and blessed of God. In the words of the Psalmist I would say, "The entrance of Thy word giveth light," also "The law of the Lord is perfect converting the soul," and in the words of the hymn writer:

A glory gilds the sacred page, Majestic like the sea; It gives a light to every age: It gives but borrows none.
