EDITORIAL

THE CONQUERING CHRIST OUR SAVIOUR

"He led captivity captive and gave gifts unto men." Eph. 4-8.

The apostle Paul like Isaiah of old gives us two very important pictures of Jesus, one the suffering servant, the other the mighty conqueror. The first picture represents His humanity. In His incarnation the Son of God became the Son of Man. He took upon Him the seed of Abraham. He took our place and suffered for us. "He took upon Him the form of a servant." "He came not to be ministered unto: but to minister and to give His life a ransom for many." In Christ's resurrection He manifested His Deity, His glorious triumph over His foes.

In the words of our text Paul is representing Jesus as a military man who went out and fought and conquered His foes, and came back in great triumph riding in His chariot and leading His vanquished foes, bound with chains, behind Him. This custom was quite common to the Romans in Paul's day. The apostle declares that Jesus did this when He arose from the dead, and ascended up on high. He also says that Christ descended first, into the lower parts of the earth. In His incarnation, His humble birth, His sufferings and death, He made His descent. He came down to humanity's'level, yea, in His suffering for sinners, He touched the lowest stratum of mankind, for He tasted death for every man. Our debt of sin which Justice rightly demanded of us is paid, is cancelled.

soldiers and others as a token of his gratitude for his victory.

So Jesus as the champion of our cause has bestowed great gifts upon the children of men. He said, "I give unto them 'Eternal Life'." The apostle Paul also said, "The gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." But Paul in this text in Eph. 4-8 seems to be referring to the gift of the Holy Spirit which Jesus sent down on His disciples on the day of Pentecost. He said unto them before His crucifixion, (read in John 14): "If ye love Me keep my commandments, and I will pray the Father and He will give you another Comforter, that He may abide with you forever, even the spirit of truth whom the world cannot receive," etc. Note the gift of the Holy Spirit the Comforter is for God's people exclusive of all others. He says the world cannot receive Him, because it seeth Him not neither knoweth Him; but ye know Him for He dwelleth with you and shall be in you." John 14:15 to 17.

So our risen Lord is bestowing this wonderful gift on His friends, His people, who believe and seek Him. Has He sent the Comforter to you? Have ye received the Holy Ghost since ye believed?
