Dear Highway Reader:

As the time for our "Alliance and Camp-meeting" is near I recall the first one that was at Woodstock the year following our organization in 1888, November 3rd.

As we were living in Woodstock we were privileged to be at the meeting and to have a part in meeting the ministers and delegates who came there. There was a real feeling of fellowship and a zeal and divine energy which brought great blessing upon the meeting.

There was a note of victory as well as the sense of the importance of the occasion, as it was a history-making one.

The key-note of the entire session was Prayer, as the brothers and sisters felt the neer of guidance from God as they formulated plans for the future. All of the ministers and officers and nearly all the delegates who attended this Alliance have been called "Up Higher." Mrs. Simon McLeod, Mrs. N. S. Boyer, Mrs. A. L. Bubar and Mr. L. C. Watt and Mrs. S. A. Baker are all the delegates I recall as being alive at the present time.

During the following year the Alliance was held at St. John, Sandford, Millville and North Head.

In 1894 we came to Beulah and that was a notable gathering from many standpoints. As we were on the grounds nearly six weeks before the Alliance opened we had enjoyed the beautiful springtime, the wild flowers, the beauty of the river and our anticipation of meeting with the dear friends who we were hoping would come. There was so much to be gotten in readiness for the arrival of the people, we were never lonesome, and looked forward with plesaure for the day when the delegates and people would come. Needless to say we were glad when the steamer would come to the wharf as there were songs of praise to God for giving us this beautiful spot.

The only building the first year was "Cedar-dale," and our little Camp and two cottages which were being built.

As we have reached the fiftieth milestone and have come together for our "Anniversary Alliance," we should come with praise and gratitude for all that God has done for us as a little company of people.

The result of these fifty years of faithful preaching should convince us all that those who led the way in this movement to spread Scriptura! Holiness where divinely guided. As we enter upon another epoch we have no reason to fear, as God is still on the throne. "The mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting, upon them that fear Him, and His righteousness unto children's children," to such as keep his covenant and to those that remember his commandments to do them, "He hath remembered his covenant forever the word which he commanded to a thousand generation." Ps. 105:8. But we see there are conditions to be met, we must keep His commandments.

We must not turn to the cutoms and follies of the world with its amusements and fads, for we read in John 2:15: "Love not the world, neither the things of the world, if any man love the world the love of the Father is not in him." There are two great events in our denominational year, which hundreds of people look forward to with happy anticipation. These are our Alliance and Camp Meeting at Beulah Camp Ground, Brown's Flats, N. B., and our other Camp Meeting at Riverside Camp-Ground, Robinson's, Maine.

It may be of interest to some and no doubt to all, the history in connection with the establishment of our camp ground at Brown's Flats, N. B.

At the Alliance held at Millville July 1st, 1892, the following resolution was submitted and moved by Rev. A. Kinney: Resolved, in order to promote the blessed doctrine and experience of holiness, and to reach as large a number as possible, and to make the best use of ourselves, therefore be it

Resolved. That one or more central and proper and convenient places be selected for our annual meetings where buildings may be erected to entertain the public and all who may attend, and that it be held after the manner of camp meetings.

Further resolved, That a committee of seven be appointed to select and purchase such place and grounds and make such preparation for our annual meetings; and further

Resolved, That this Alliance instruct such committee as to expenses and as far as possible meet such expenses.

This resolution was seconded by Rev. G. W. McDonald and Rev. Wm. Kinghorn, and unanimously passed. The following are the names of the committee appointed by the Alliance: Rev. A. Kinney, Nova Scotia; Rev. H. H. Cosman, Nova Scotia; Brother L. C. Watt, Grand Manan; Rev. G. W. McDonald, St. John: Rev. Wm. Kinghorn, Fredericton; Rev. G. B. Trafton, Millville; Brother James E Drysdale, Woodstock.

On motion—Resolved, That the collections taken during the meetings of this Alliance go towards the purchasing of said place and
