KNEELING IN PRAYER

Commenting on suit in the courts of Louisiana where damages were asked by a woman who claimed that an accident resulted in her inability to kneel in prayer, the Southern Christian Advocate says:

"Kneeling as an inestimable approach to God is substantiated all through the sacred Scriptures. We read that Solomon made a brazen scaffold, 'and upon it he stood, and kneeled down upon his knees before all the congregation of Israel, and spread forth his hands toward heaven,' (2 Chron. 6:13).

"Ezra discloses, 'And at the evening sacrifice, I arose up from my heaviness; and, having rent my garment and my mantle, I fell upon my knees, and spread out my hands unto the Lord my God,' (Ezra 9:5).

"The Psalmist cries, 'Oh, come, let us worship and bow down: let us kneel before the Lord our maker.' (Psalm 96:6).

"Daniel—'Now when Daniel knew that the writing was signed, he went into his house; and his windows being open in his chamber toward Jerusalem, he kneeled upon his knees three times a day, and prayed, and gave thanks before his God, as he did aforetime,' (Daniel 6:10).

"Stephen—'And he kneeled down, and cried with a loud voice, Lord, lay not this sin to their charge. And when he had said this, he fell asleep,' (Acts 7:60).

"Paul—'For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ,' (Eph. 3:14).

"Though not the only approach to God, kneeling is obviously the most satisfying to the aspiring soul, yea, to the agonizing soul."—Wesleyan Methodist.

According to a statement made by Senator Pope of Idaho the United States has been selling to Japan as much as fifty-four per cent of the materials absolutely necessary to Japan in carrying on the war against China, and this in spite of the fact that Congress by the Neutrality Act passed some time ago provided a law that would close down on the shipping of war supplies to an aggressor nation in the case of armed conflict. We understand that the attitude of the administration is that there was no declaration of war made by Japan, nevertheless there is war; one of the most vicious and unreasonable campaigns ever made on a nation in modern times. Now, since Japan has possession of the coast cities and seaports of China and proposes to close the "open door" of American trade, we read Japan is being warned by our secretary of state on this loss of trade.
