#### **EDITORIAL**

For what is your life? It is even a vapour that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away.

There are very many meanings to the word life as every reader knows and which we will not take time nor space to mention. In this place James the writer seems to be referring to our natural, or animal life, the space of time between our birth and death. I suppose when we come to the end of the year, and look back and see how quickly the time has gone we are often reminded of the foregoing words of the apostle. We think also of the words of Job, when he said, "My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle." And of course when we stop to think how swiftly our days are passing that gives us cause for serious thought, because it means vastly more to live than to merely have an existence of a number of years here upon earth. For man who was created in the image of his Maker became a living soul when God breathed into his nostrils. God imparted something which the Bible calls spirit to him that does not cease to exist, but goes to God who gave it when man ceases to live here. That something which we call spirit or soul makes man different from the lower animals and all other forms of life: for God did not breathe into the nostrils of any other creature that He made when He gave them natural life.

The Bible also speaks of other phases of life beside cur natural life and also greatly emphasizes them. We would mention first that life which we receive when we are born again or regenerated. Jesus so emphasized this that He said "Except ye eat My flesh and drink My blood ye have no life in you." Meaning of course that we must be partakers of His nature, or receive regenerating life in our souls to be saved. The Apostle Paul also emphasized the spiritual life when he wrote to the Ephesians, "You hath he quickened who were dead in trespasses and sins." Our Lord also said, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." And again in His prayer in John 17 Jesus also spoke of eternal life which He gives to those who know Him and the Father who sent Him into the world.

And so the question comes to us again, What is your life? or what does it consist of? a mere animal life, eating, drinking, sleeping, seeking pleasure? or trying to gratify the natural desires like the lower animals? Is that all the life that we know? We may have that form of life and still be "dead in trespasses and sins." Jesus came to give us spiritual life, or life for our souls, and that in abundance, which means a strong healthy active soul and that is what constitutes holiness

or perfect love. When the soul is regenerated and cleansed from the disease of sin it becomes a living healthy organism endowed with eternal life.

What is your life? Is it one of seeking material things, money, wealth, power? Paul said a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of thigs that he possesseth. What is it? we ask again. Is it one of seeking ease and comfort for our bodies or our natural lives? Jesus said whosoever shall seek to save his life shall lose it: but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake three children)? shall find it. Then we gather from all these scriptures that life at its best does not consist of mere natural life, or of worldly wealth or pleasures, or ease and comfort for our bodies: But life in the truest sense is found only in Jesus. Let us quote the apostle again: "For to me to live is Christ and to die is gain." And again, when Christ who is our life shall appear then shall ye also appear with Him in glory. These as well as many other scriptures teach us that the life which Jesus provided for us at the cost of His own reaches far beyond this present short fleeting time of three score and ten years, for it comprehends eternity with God the loving Father and Jesus the elder Brother, the beautiful angels and all the happy throng of Blood washed saints who sing their songs of praise and salvation around the throne of God. That is life everlasting.
