BIBLE STUDY

(H. C. Mullen)) Lesson IV., Mark 7-9

Chapter VII.—

GOSPEL OF MARK Lesson V. Chapters 10-12

Chapter X.—

1. Jesus returns to Judea and proclaims the Gospel of the Kingdom there.

2. He replies to the questions of the Pharisees regarding divorce. There is very little scripture upon which to justify divorce and re-marriage. If people would take God into account and seek His guidance before marriage there would be no need of divorces.
