BIBLE STUDY

(H. C. Mullen)

The Gospel of Mark, presenting Jesus as God's Servant

Lesson I. Introductory. Noting following hints, please begin to read the Gospel through. I. The Author—

Little is known of the author of this Gospel. Adam Clark is authority for the following: "John Mark was the son of a pious woman called Mary, who dwelt at Jerusalem. She was an early believer, and the disciples used to meet at her house. The first mention of John Mark assures us of Peter's intimacy in that family. It is almost universally allowed that the Mark mentioned by Peter, I. Peter 5:13, is this evangelist, and that he is the same with him who is called sister's son to Barnabas, Col. 4:10, and is supposed to have been converted by Peter to the Christian faith."

We find his name connected with Paul and Barnabas in Acts 12:25. Later Mark was the cause of a slight difference between these men (Acts 15:37-39) but Paul and he later became fully reconciled as appears in 2 Tim. 4:11. Some have supposed that Mark was a secretary to St. Peter and wrote the gospel at his dictation.

II. Purpose and Plan-

The keynote is "Behold Thy Servant."

There is evidence that this Gospel was written for the Romans as Matthew was written for the Jews. That it was written for a Gentile people is shown by the fact that all Jewish ordinances and ceremonies were carefully explained (Chap 7:1-4) which would not have been necessary if written to Jews.

The ideal of the Roman was power. A world-conqueror, who like Caesar could subdue all nations and form them into a great empire, would naturally appeal to them. It appears that the purpose of the writer of this gospel was to present to the Roman mind just such an Almighty Worker and Conqueror.

We notice in this study that Jesus proves himself a conqueror in every realm. Men and devils, nature, sickness, wind and waves, obey His commands.

This is the Gospel of the works of Christ rather than of His sermons. No genealogy is given, nor does Mark try to prove the deity of Christ. The Roman cared little whence a man came, so long as he had power. They worshipped power expressing itself in action. With a very brief introduction we are rushed into the midst of miracles and are nervously hurried from one miraculous event to another. Before one is well out of the way another is approaching. Characteristic words convey the idea of rapid conquest. Note these carefully and mark them. One of these words is the key-word of the whole Gospel.

Questions for research and discussion:

- 1. Find scripture references to Mark.
- 2. To what people was this Gospel probably written?
- 3. What particular word characterizes the whole book?
- 4. Why did Mark carefully explain Jewish customs?
- 5. Did Mark try to prove the deity of Christ?

Besides the essay which was selected as best, there were several others, all of which were splendid on the book studied. Rev. F. A. Dunlop, who prepared the lessons on Matthew, and judged the essays, said: "The papers were all unusually good, and showed careful study and research on the part of those who wrote." So we not only congratulate Brother Mullen, but all those who have done such good work. Now, as we take up the study of the second Gospel, let us have an even larger number studying with us. The response in the study of the first series of lessons was very gratifying, and we trust it shall not be less in this second series. We would welcome letters of inquiry and comment from those participating in the study.
