OVER 18 MILLION COPIES OF THE BIBLE
CIRCULATED LAST YEAR

Over seven million Bibles were circulated by the American Bible Society last year, and over eleven million by the British and Foreign Bible Society during the same period, it was revealed in reports of the two organizations just made public. Both reports point particularly to increases in the number of Bibles circulated in China despite war there.

The annual circulation of the American Bible Society was 7,328,550 copies of Bibles, Testaments and portions of the Bible in 197 languages and dialects, including different systems for the blind. This marks the thirteenth successive year in which the annual circulation of the American Society topped the seven million mark.

The circulation figure for the British and Foreign Bible Society was given as 11,318,575, only 25,373 fewer than the year before. The war in Spain was responsible for this small shrinkage.—War Cry.
