"ILL BLOWS THE WIND THAT PROFITS NOBODY"

We British subjects have been greatly disturbed over the loss of so many vessels, sunk by the Germans. But we read an article today which made us wish that the Germans might get two more. Taken from an Ottawa paper it reads as follows: There are two ships on the Atlantic tonight with 231,000 cases of eight year old Scotch whiskey on board. If the Germans get it there is going to be a shortage of aged Scotch before long. The price is going up already because British ships carrying them to New York are travelling in expensive envoys, and insurance rates for both British and United States vessels have soared since the start of the war. Before long nobody is likely to be permitted to grow barley or corn in Great Britain except for food, all of which will make whiskey scarcer, etc. Editors note—If the war stops the manufacture of liquor, then in that respect it will be a blessing and save many lives from the curse of strong drink. We are very sorry indeed that human lives are lost with the vessels that the Germans sink, and pray there may be no more; but we pray that they may get those two vessels loaded with liquid damnation, and all others also with a like cargo.—H. S. D.

The American people are now fast approaching the time when the liquor interests will be running the United States government. If our Constitution is thrown over for Fascism, it will be due primarily to the liquor traffic, which has never known when to stop in its nefarious and underground campaigns. The great danger of such a development cannot be over-emphasized. Even today, the liquor interests claim that they elected President Roosevelt and that it is up to him to protect them.

As a statistician, I am especially disturbed by the arguments which the liquor interests use in connection with taxation. They claim that because liquor is contributing about \$500,000,000 a year to federal and state treasuries they are entitled to special consideration. Let me tell you, however, that they are telling you only one-half of the story. The other half is that liquor, on which they pay this tax, has so wrecked the character of thousands that our federal and state governments are now required to pay out more than \$500,000,000 a year for relief! This relief expense the country never had before the repeal of prohibition.—Roger W. Babson.

"NATION THAT FORGETS GOD ON WAY OUT"

Calgary, Oct. 23.—Challenge to Christians of today to stand up and fight for their faith or else see Christianity "bowed out of existence" was sounded here yesterday by Very Rev. John W. Woodside, of Ottawa, Moderator of the United Church of Canada.

He told the Central United Church congregation that there were 650,000,000 Christians in the world now, but the great majority of them were not completely Christian. "They are not prepared to go the whole way for Christ," he said.

"Any nation that forgets God is on the way out," he warned.
