QUARTERLY MEETING

The Quarterly Meeting of District No. 1 convened with the Church at Lower Brighton, March 23rd-26th.

On Thursday evening, the President, Rev. L. T. Sabine, brought an inspiring message from the text, "And Jesus returned in the power of the Spirit," Luke 4:14,

O Friday evening Rev. P. J. Trafton delivered a stirring message on Revival. Text: "Wilt thou not revive us again?" Ps. 85:6.

At the business session on Saturday afternoon the President was in the chair. The following pastors were present: Rev. L. T. Sabine, Rev. P. J. Trafton, Rev. H. C. Mullen, Rev. S. G. Hilyard. Delegates present were as follows: Hartland, Gordonsville, Victoria Corner, Lower Brighton

The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Rev. H. C. Mullen; vice president, Rev. S. G. Hilyard; secretary, Flora M. O. Brown; treasurer, Mr. Byron Brown. Highway Agent, Rev. L. T. Sabine.

Encouraging reports were read from Victoria Corner, Lower Brighton, Royalton, Island Falls and Woodstock, and several gave verbal reports.

A general discussion followed, regarding conditions in the various churches, and the need of a revival. The matter of the Sunday school convention was brought up, and a motion was passed that the president, and Brother F. K. Brown act as a committee to consult with the officers of the S. S. Convention, and if necessary arrange a program for the convention in June. A vote of thanks was extended to the church for entertainment. An invitation from Lower Hainesville to hold the next Quarterly Meeting there was accepted, said meeting to be held over the first Sunday in June.

The devotional committee then brought in its report, and after some remarks by the President, Rev. L. T. Sabine spoke briefly, encouraging people to subscribe to the Highway. Motion for adjournment was followed by the Doxology and the meeting was closed with prayer by the President.

Saturday evening, preaching by Rev. S. G. Hilyard. Text: "They have refused to return." Jer. 5:3. Theme: "Decided Ungodliness."

Sunday morning the Love Feast was led by Ralph Sabine, of Woodstock. Rev. P. J. Trafton preached at the 11 o'clock service. Text: "But one thing is needful," Luke 10:42.

Sunday afternoon Rev. S. G. Hilyard brought a unique and striking message which brought conviction, using the text, "Alas, for it was borrowed," II. Kings 6:5. Theme: "Where You May Have Lost the Blessing and Where You Can Find It."

The closing sermon was by Rev. P. J. Trafton. Text: Luke 15:14, "And he began to be in want." It was a fine evangelistic message, honored by the Spirit, and bringing conviction. This was followed by an inspiring testimony meeting, after which one backslider returned to the Lord.

The attendance at the Quarterly was not large but considering the time of year, was quite satisfactory. The preaching was of a very high order, a beautiful spirit pervaded at all the meetings, and the people were blessed and encouraged.
