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EDITORIAL

THAT THE WORK MAY GO ON

During the few years that our Young People's Association has been fuctioning, there has been a keen interest in the financial enterprises of the organization, and a unity of effort to support the General and Self-Denial Funds. The work that has been carried on by the money received by our Association has been a gratifying reward to all who have contributed.

From our General Fund we have contributed each year the sum of seventy-five dollars to the support of the King's Highway. All will agree that this is a sound investment, and one that we should continue to make. Then for the past two or three years, the young people have been contributing twenty-five dollars to the expense of beautifving our Beulah campground. We have mentioned before in our writings of this plan, but for those who are not familiar with it we will describe it briefly. The past two years, and now again this year, we have sent three or four young men to the campground ten days before the Alliance meetings, and these young men, under the direction of Bro. Hicks, chairman of the grounds committee, work ten days in repairing and beautifying the buildings and grounds of Beulah. This effort has produced a great improvement in our beautiful campground, and by faith in the continued support of our young people's societies and friends we expect to carry on. Also we have expenses relating to the ordinary work of the young people's work, and therefore we trust this fund will be faithfully supported by your generous contributions again this year.

The money received in our Self-Denial Fund has hitherto been given to the General Foreign Mission Fund, but last year the young people decided they would like to undertake the support of Grace Sanders, feeling that this would give us more of a personal interest in the missionary work. To accomplish this objective, we must have at least three hundred and fifty dollars contributed to this fund. A very keen interest in this plan was demonstrated at Beulah last year, and we are hoping that the amount given at the year's close will indicate that appearance of interest was genuine.

SAMUEL BLEDSOE

Samuel Bledsoe, president of the Sante Fe Railroad, has just died. Newspapers disclose that he was a Kentucky mountain boy who never saw a train until he was fifteen years old. He worked his way through high school and college, taught in country schools, and studied law. On a capital of \$50 he set up a law practice in a little town in Oklahoma. He did some local service for the Sante Fe. Then the railroad employed him again. Step by step he went up to the highest place in that great system.

The story is like that of a hundred or thousand others. The great men of America have usually fought their way up. But in this day boys look to the W.P.A. or the C.C.C., which is a semidole relation to the government. They are asking for unemployment insurance and old age insurance; they wonder whether Communism has some easy way. Their ears are open to various harebrained social theories and schemes which they are told are better than our terrible capitalism. "Why don't you go to school?" is asked of the boy or girl. "Can't. No money. No one to pay my way. There is no chance for a young fellow any more."

Yet there never was a better chance for young people who become trained and competent.

An awful depression struck America in 1893. Revealing the situation rather well a young man said, "I do not have to work. I can either work or starve, and I would rather work." He did not even loaf until he could get his price. He worked for what he could get. Today he could go on relief. Easy relief is not the way to the presidency of a railroad.—Free Methodist.
