REPORT OF ANNUAL CONVENTION

He finally traced him to Texas, after he had been away for six years, and learned that he was ill, and was going to St. Louis to the hospital. The letter would be waiting for his son when he reached St. Louis, telling him of the continued love of his parents, and that the old home was full of welcome for him. On his telegraphing his willingness to return, the father immediately telegraphed him money to come home in a drawing-room car, in comfort and a style befitting the son of such a father. That is a good illustration of the way our Heavenly Father treats poor prodigal men and women who have wandered away in their anger and rebellion. He not only follows poor sinners with invitations to return, but he goes ahead of them, and meets them on their journey into the deeper depths of misery brought about by their sins, with assurances that forgiveness and love are waiting at the mercy seat.
