There are thousands of Natives working in the many gold mines which stretch over many miles of land, who never have the gospel preached to them. There are some Missionaries working there but they are few, and can reach but a small number. Let us put these thousands on our prayer list and ask God to send forth more labourers into the harvest field which is white already to harvest.

One dear sister writes that she is in rather straightened circumstances so that now she cannot give to the Lord's work as she longs to, and was able to do in the past, but says, "I can pray." There may be some others who have wished they had something to give but have nothing—dear friends, you too "can pray." "The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much."

My desire is "to KNOW HIM" better this year than ever before, and I mean to press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."

Dear Homeland Friends: Jan. 15th, 1939

Greetings from Him, who standing with us at the threshold of this New Year says: "Behold I have set before thee an open door which no man can shut."

All God's promises in Him are "Yea and Amen!" It seems He has taken great pains to show us how very welcome we are at the Mercy Seat, how very willing He is to hear our case, commanding us "in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." Promising us, "Fear not, I will do to thee all that thou requirest." "This is the confidence that we have in Him, that, if we ask anything according to His will, He heareth us; and if we know that he heareth us we know that we have the petitions that we desired of Him.

You know, we somehow do not seem to realize just now He loves to give and longs to bless and to save and to restore these very souls whom He is laying it upon our hearts to pray for.

In 1938 He kept a spirit of revival on this work from center to circumference. Our prayer is before Him this year for "more than this" (which He assures us He is able to give).

We are seeing a strong tide of blessing and victory and answers to many prayers. Through the open door of the New Year, looking down the vista of the days to come we see—many souls still unsaved—heathen are still around us on every hand. Jesus is longing

to save them. Pray with us. He gives us anew his promise: "Ask of Me and I will give thee the heathen for thine inheritance." **Many backsliders unreclaimed.** His promise is, if any man see his brother sin a sin which is not unto death, he shall ask and He shall give him life. Many such He has already given us—shall we not "ask" and receive more.

**Many converts still unsanctified.** "This is the will of God even your sanctification." Let us pray for His will for them. We know He hears this prayer and "we know we have the petitions that we desired of Him."

**Territory still unclaimed.** Away to the east of us, extending from our Ngenetsheni outpost is Lounsburg District. There are numbers of large kraals without the gospel. Could we establish a mission station on our government grant at "Draaiom," where we already have a little church, and a good evangelist stationed, and a school started. There is at present a large prospect for expansion. This district is often visited by malaria (though our site is healthy) and we little know how long these souls may have before they will pass beyond our reach. Will you not by earnest prayer claim some of this "uttermost part of the earth for thy possession?" He says if you ask He will give it to you.

He has given us ten beautiful years together in His service here. We do not know how much longer it is in His will for us to serve Him here. But oh we do want these precious days to count for all He can make them to this work and to these souls and for Him here!
