## HONOUR THE KING

I think that our readers will all agree with me when I say that the people of Canada have fulfilled this command of the Apostle Peter to perfection. That is, if spending lots of money and time in decorating our cities in preparation of the visit of Their Majesties in a mark of honour, and if greetings from very large crowds of people everywhere are expressions of honour, then they were honoured. Because of the very cordial receptions that Their Majesties have received while visiting in the United States as well as in Canada, they ought to have a very favorable impression of the people of this great continent.

We have not heard of any one attempting to do them any harm in any way, which might be expected if they were travelling in some other countries; but on the other hand, everything seems to have been done to make their visit pleasant, which ought to impress them with the fact that generally speaking, in this land where the gospel of Jesus Christ has been preached, and where the Bible is in the hands of or within reach of everybody, it has by its influence produced a God-fearing, peace-loving people. There is no country in the world where human life is held more sacred, or is safer, where womankind is honoured more, and where old age and little children, and the weak are more respected and supported by the strong, and this is all because of the influence that God's Holy Word which He said would not return to Him void, has had upon men's hearts and lives. We are pleased to note that some of our great secular journals such as the Moncton Daily Times are giving us scripture quotations every day in a conspicuous place in their papers. This is indeed a very effective way of putting the Word of God into the hands of the masses, and is a very commendable thing for the management of these papers to do. But the Apostle Peter not only bids us Honour the King, but he commands us to fear God also, which is of more importance than honouring the King, as praiseworthy as that is. God has said them that honour Me I will honour. I. Sam. 2-30. Hundreds of thousands of loyal British subjects have tried to express their patriotism to our King and Queen during their recent visit to Canada, and hundreds of thousands of those subjects were not seen nor recognized by Their Majesties, and will never be seen, or heard by them again. But those who honour God have the promise that

He will in return honour them. Not one of them will be lost sight of by Him in the crowd: And He will never leave us nor forsake us as earthly kings sometimes do. We read in history that when Thomas Wolsey lost the royal favor and was banished from court by Henry VIII., arrested, charged with high treason and sent to prison, before he died, he said, if I had served my God as faithfully as I have served my king, He would not have forsaken me now in the time of my old age. But how can we honour God? you ask: First, we must recognize His great claims upon us. We are His creatures by right of creation, and redemption. But in our unsaved state we are living in rebellion against God, and are children of wrath or of the wicked one. We must repent of our sins, turn away from them, seek forgiveness, or reconciliation with God. Believe His word and believe on His Son Jesus Christ, and we shall receive, according to His promise remission of sins. If we would honour Him we must yield ourselves, our wills, our all to Him in humble consecration. As believers according to Rom. 12 present our bodies a living sacrifice wholly acceptable to God, which is our reasonable service. Then we will love God and keep His words, Jesus said: And My Father will love you, and we will come unto you and make our abode with you. John 14-23. Notice he said, we will make our abode with you, live with you which is the very highest kind of honour. That means eternal life. So while we honour our King let us be sure to fear and honour our God also.
