

Creek, New Zion, Ripples, Lakeville Corner, Maquipit and French Lake's Section (this was a long, thick settled country section), Randell Connor, and some parts of Minto. I did not finish up all of Minto as my time did not permit; Belleisle Bay West Side, Belleisle Creek, Belleisle Station Section, Searsville, Bull Moose Hill, Springfield, Stewartown, Hatfield's Point.

I also visited again the new settlers on the Broad Road (so called), Queens County, making in all 2,710 calls or visits, distributing more Scriptures than any previous season. The Scriptures distributed included 475 Bibles, 354 Testaments, 3,238 portions, amounting to \$490.89, making in all 4,067 pieces of Scriptures in three months. Among this number of Scriptures were the following in foreign languages, i.e., 1 Bible in Russian; 1 Testament in Russian; 27 Testaments in French; 4 Testaments in Hungarian; 8 Testaments in Polish; 6 Testaments in Slovak; 4 Testaments in Finnish; 85 Gospels in French; 4 Gospels in Finnish; 5 Gospels in Hungarian; 4 Gospels in Spanish.

I found 25 families without any Bible or portion of a Bible in their home. These families I left a Bible suitable for their home. I found many very poor and destitute families and some very pitiful homes needing an encouraging word, and affording an opportunity of pointing them to the Word of God and to Jesus the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world. Truly, the fields are white already to harvest and the laborers are few.

It has been truly said, "The Bible is a treasure; it contains enough to make us rich for time and eternity; it contains the key of heaven; it contains the title—deeds of an inheritance incorruptible that fadeth not away."
