Altona Mission Station
Aug. 2, 1939

Dear Highway Friends:

Another Beulah Camp has been enjoyed by many and now it is history, but we were so glad to hear of the good preaching by the evangelist, also that many who attended were helped and blessed. We also thanked the dear Lord when we heard that so many of our dear young people were keeping true to Him. May God especially bless and strengthen our people is our daily prayer.

I think that you would like to hear something about our work, and to begin with, I want to tell you that we are still very happy in the Lord; it's a different land, but it doesn't seem strange to be here; it seems very natural, and I believe when we obey God's call for service, He gives us a contented happy feeling in whatever place He calls us to.

A week ago last Sunday we had our first funeral here at Altona. George and Eugene had an appointment for that day, so George went alone to the outpost and Eugene carried on the service here. Many heathen attended, which gave a grand opportunity to preach to them. This girl who had died was baptized by Brother MacDonald and Eugene on our first Sunday at Altona. She was not well then and rapidly failed in strength. She died of T. B.

Eugene and George made a nice coffin on Saturday night and the girl's people were very pleased. It was not a mournful service for Felita was ready to go and just before she died she told them not to cry for her for she was alright. She was going to Heaven.

This girl had been the sweetheart of a boy who already had other girls, but before we arrived she gave him up and it was so nice to think that everything was all settled and she was ready to go to meet her Lord.

Oh, dear homeland young people, do continue to pray for these dear young people here. Their life is hard, especially in the heathen kraals, and often sin is forced upon them. I do thank God for our faithful young people who are walking with God and obeying His commands. It isn't always an easy walk but it surely pays to serve Jesus.

We had the privilege of attending the Quarterly Meeting at Hartland during the last days of June. It was so nice to see and enjoy fellowship with our missionaries. These meetings reminded us of Beulah. They were well attended by the natives and many received spiritual help.

We were able to attend a church wedding of two of our young Christians also while there. It was a very pretty wedding. The young people were nicely dressed and Grace had even made a wedding cake for the occasion.

Brother MacDonald and Charles Sanders baptized several young girls on Sunday afternoon. It was a lovely day and we enjoyed this service too.

Our work here is going on very nicely. Engene and George are most always away to distant outposts on Sunday but I usually stay here at Altona and help with the services.

We have S. S. each Sunday morning; for the first two and a half months we only averaged an attendance of twelve but I was delighted last Sunday when twenty were present. Our native children need spiritual teaching for often they have little or no help at

home and I feel that if we can teach them to love God's Word while they are still young they will find it easier to love Him and trust Him as they grow older.

Last Sunday just before Sunday school began, a heathen woman came with amabele to sell. We told her that we did not buy things on Sunday, but she could leave it and return on Monday for her money. We invited her to stay to S. S. and she seemed to enjoy it. I gave her a card and she was very interested in that and asked if the story was there too. The children like the cards very much. I am sure the dear Canadian children will be glad to hear that the cards they sent out to the little African children are being used here. These boys and girls love to have them, and I find them a great help as I tell them the Bible stories. I also find the Picture Rolls very helpful too in teaching the lessons, and I want to thank all who sent these useful things.

I usually preach each Sunday afternoon. When we first came our native teacher acted as my interpreter and we managed very nicely. Then for three weeks during the vacation I found it hard to get a message for the people but by using mostly scripture I arranged a brief talk. We have a new teacher now and she will interpret for me which will make it better.

We have class meetings each Thursday. In the morning we have a Bible study. Recently Eugene has taken up the church covenant and we have been studying it clause by clause. In the afternoon we have a preaching and a testimony meeting. It does us good to hear these dear people pray and testify. God truly has done a great work in the hearts of many of them.

So many of our people live so far away it is impossible to have night services very often. Many live miles away and they walk long distances to attend services and receive spiritual help. One Sunday it was raining very hard and I thought we would only have the few who live nearby out to the service, but to my surprise, nineteen came. Some had walked miles through a cold rain to get here and were wet through but that didn't seem to dampen their spirits for we had a lovely service. At the close we sang, "There shall be showers of blessings" in Zulu and I feel sure that we were all blessed in our souls.

Now, dear friends, I must close. May God richly bless you all as you labor in the dear homeland and as you pray for your work in Africa. May God keep us all faithful to the end and may we with joy enter into His presence bringing our sheaves with us.

As pastor, I wish to express my appreciation of the kindness af the congregation of the Woodstock Church. I am entering upon the fifth year and pray that this may be a year filled with rich blessing to all.

May God bless all our churches and pastors, and grant sweet unity and co-operation that with united sacrifice, prayer and faith the work shall prosper.
